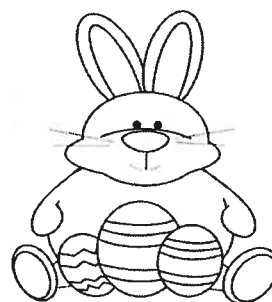

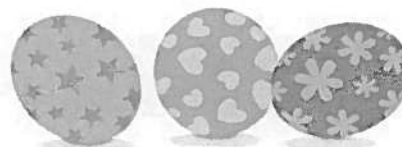

Granville WWII Veteran honored by Norway with Viking Medallion for 1945 mission

It was an honor he should have received 69 years ago, but Trygve S. Petersen of Granville was finally pinned Thursday with the Norwegian defense medal for fighting against the German occupation of Norway in 1945.

Petersen, 95, was among American soldiers from the 99th battalion who worked with the Norwegian military in their fight against the Germans. Because he was wounded, he wasn't able to receive the medal while in service, but Norwegian officials made sure Petersen received the recognition he deserved. As Capt. Yngve Skoglund, from the Norway liaison NATO office in Virginia, pinned the medal on to Petersen's original military uniform, an emotional Petersen said, "I wish the men of my battalion were here."

"They are in your soul," Skoglund responded.

Humbled by the honor, Petersen told the crowd gathered at the Southwick American Legion Post 338 that his memories of World War II and his involvement in the mission in Norway are tempered by the loss of men in his unit.

"I find it so hard to accept something for me when there are so many men who earned it more," he said.

Petersen's son, Karl A. Petersen, also of Granville, said as the years have gone by, his father's memories of his service in the military have become more vivid, and most of those recollections involve the service men who lost their lives.

"He always felt that the real heroes were the men who didn't come home," he said, adding that for him, his father taught him the true meaning of hero.

"I've always been proud of him," the younger Petersen said. "When I was a kid I thought John Wayne was a hero. Now I know my dad was the real hero."

As the pinning ceremony of the Viking medallion ended, veterans and well-wishers lined up to shake Petersen's hand and thank him for his service. From youngsters to senior citizens and veterans from multiple conflicts, Petersen was given a hero's welcome seven decades after he returned from war.

Robert G. Kough, commander of Post 338, said the recognition bestowed on Petersen, a member of the Southwick American Legion, was a true honor to the local post.

"It's our honor to have this man here," he said.

Of Petersen's clear memories of his World War II service, Kough said it is a common military experience to "remember people who had your back."

"There are things you don't forget," he said.

Recipe for the month

Mini Cheesecakes

1 cup graham cracker crumbs
 ¾ cup plus 2 tbsp sugar divided
 3 tbsp butter or margarine, melted
 3 - 8 oz. pkgs cream cheese, softened
 1 tsp vanilla

3 eggs

1 cup whipping cream

2 cups blueberries

1 tbsp lemon zest

Heat oven to 325, mix graham cracker crumbs, 2 tbsp sugar and butter until well blended, press into bottoms of lined muffin tins

Beat cream cheese, sugar and vanilla until well blended, add eggs, 1 at a time mixing on low speed after each egg just until blended, pour over crusts. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until centers are almost set, cool completely, refrigerate for 2 hours.

Beat whipping cream at high speed until stiff peaks form, spread onto cheesecakes, to with blueberries and zest.

Home Modification Loan Program

About the program

The state funded Home Modification Loan Program provides loans to make modifications to the primary, permanent residence of elders, adults with disabilities, and families with children with disabilities. The modifications to be made to the residence must be necessary to allow the beneficiary to remain in the home and must relate to their ability to function on a daily basis.

Eligibility

Any homeowner who is an elder, has a disability or has a household member who is an elder or has a disability is eligible. Landlords with fewer than 10 units may be eligible for a 3% loan for a tenant. The proposed modifications must relate to the functional limitation of the beneficiary as documented by a professional with whom there is a client history. This program is not a home repair program. Some examples of projects funded through this program include ramps, hardwired alarm systems and other safety modifications, as well as accessible bathrooms and kitchens.

Types of Loans Available

Based on the income guidelines, you may qualify for a loan of \$1000.00 up to \$30,000.00 which is secured by a promissory note and a mortgage lien. This program offers 0% or 3% deferred payment loans and 3% amortizing loans depending on the total gross household income. Please see the frequently asked questions sheet for the income limits. Homeowners eligible for a 0% loan do not make any monthly payments and no interest accrues. Repayment is required when the property is sold or has its title transferred. 3% loans require monthly payments and must be paid back in 5 – 15 years, depending on the total amount borrowed. The program only allows for one loan per property, making it important to think about all necessary home modifications, present and future.

Application process

Applications are reviewed by six regional Provider Agencies to determine both income eligibility and eligibility of the proposed modification. Providers determine eligibility by evaluating documentation submitted with the application including, but not limited to, income verification, a professional's certification the proposed modification relates to the beneficiary's ability to function on a day to day basis, verification of paid state income and property taxes, property deed and home modifications plans, is available.

How to get started

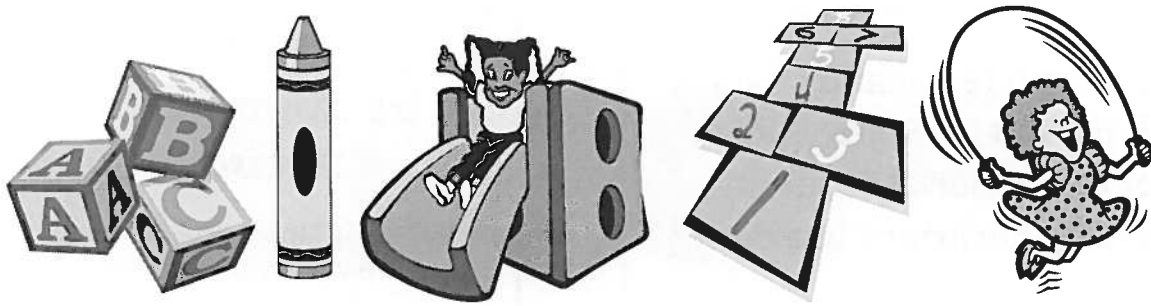

KINDERGARTEN SCREENING FOR SOUTHWICK-TOLLAND-GRANVILLE CHILDREN

The Southwick-Tolland-Granville Regional School District Kindergarten Screening for the 2014-2015 school year will be held from **Monday, June 2nd through Tuesday, June 3rd, 2014 at Woodland School** for Southwick, Tolland and Granville residents.

In order to be eligible for Kindergarten, a child must be ***five years old on or before September 1, 2014***. There will be no exceptions to this policy. As required by Special Education Law, Chapter 766, screenings will be conducted in the areas of hearing, vision, speech/language, cognitive and motor skills. **All parents having an eligible child should come to the Woodland School office at 80 Powder Mill Road, Southwick, MA to pick up an enrollment packet between now and May 19th. Open enrollment hours are 9:15 am to 2:45 pm. Granville residents should pick up an enrollment packet at Granville School.**

A check off list is included in the packet for your convenience. Once you've filled out your paperwork and have the necessary documents (proof of residency, birth certificate, immunization record and physical) as noted on the check off list, **return ALL information to the Woodland School Office**. An appointment will be made for you at that time to attend the screening (June 2nd & June 3rd) to complete the registration process.

SHEAC has gone to the BIRDS!!



The Friends of SHAEC are sponsoring a four part series on **Birding**, taught by Science teacher Lois Kiraly, of Huntington. The three classes will meet from 3-5pm at the Russell Senior Center. The fourth meeting will be a **"Bird Walk"** at Littleville Lake.

The classes and bird walk are open to participants of all ages, are free of charge.

The topic for the first class, scheduled for Thursday, April 17th, is **Birds in winter: strategies and adaptations for winter survival**. They will explore how birds manage without boots, scarves and hats. Recognizing the bird calls of spring will also be discussed.

The second class in the series, on Thursday, May 15th, will be **Eating like a Bird**, and will discuss what types of food will attract a variety of birds to your feeders. The class will also look at the varieties of wild foods that birds eat, and how they are uniquely created for their various diets. They will also take a "closer look" at owl pellets.

The third class in the series, Thursday, June 19th, will look at back yard **Bird watching**, teaching bird identification using "field marks", habitat and bird behavior.

On Saturday, June 21st, from 8-10am, Lois will lead a **"Bird Walk"** at Littleville Dam.

RIVER SYMPOSIUM LOOKS AT THE HEALTH OF OUR WATERSHED

WESTFIELD (March 20, 2014) – "The Health of Our Watershed: Forests, Wildlife, Water" will be the focus of the Westfield River Watershed Association's 20th annual River Symposium on Saturday, April 5 in Scanlon Hall at Westfield State University. Registration is free. The keynote speaker is Jonathan Thompson, senior ecologist at the Harvard Forest who will speak on their recent study on different possible futures for the state's forested landscapes.

Other speaking program topics are: the Western Mass. Wildlife Movement Project, Three Decades of Land Use Change and its Impact on Ecosystem Services, Westfield River Basin Water Testing, Four Centuries of Change in Northeastern Forests, and Trout and Coldwater Streams in the Westfield River Watershed.

Registration opens at 8:00 a.m. The keynote address at 8:30 will be followed by speaking programs from 9:45 to 11:25. A variety of educational exhibits will be available for viewing from 11:30 to 12:15 and between speaking sessions. Raffle winners will be announced at 12:15. An afternoon animal tracks hike will round out WRWA's symposium offerings.

Symposium speakers include Tim Bridges of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Meghan Blumstein of the Harvard Forest, Leanda Fontaine-Gagnon of the Mass. Division of Fisheries and Wildlife, Laura Mars from the Nature Conservancy and Elia del Molino of the Berkshire Environmental Action.

Exhibitors from state environmental agencies and local and regional non-profit conservation and recreation organizations will bring more opportunities during program breaks to learn about the watershed and the wildlife and natural areas that grace the region. The popular Watershed on Wheels exhibit will also be on hand. To see the list of exhibitors, visit www.westfieldriver.org.
