#### **Dog Licenses**

If you have a dog(s) and I missed sending you a form, call or stop in. All dogs that are six months of age or older must be licensed annually under M.G.L. Ch. 140. An updated proof of rabies vaccination is required prior to licensing as well as proof of spaying and neutering. Incomplete applications will be returned to the sender. Fee for a spayed or neutered dog is \$10. Fee for an unaltered dog is \$15. It is the owner's responsibility to register their pets by April 15th. A late fee of \$20 will be charged after May 1st.

#### **Marriage Intentions**

The first document that the couple must complete is the Marriage Intentions Form and both must be present at the same time to do so. Following this, a license is issued and you can be married any place in the Commonwealth. Your marriage license is filed at the Town Clerk's Office where the Marriage Intentions Form is completed. 

Our Town Green is a beautiful area of Granville and is maintained by many diligent Green Committee members. The proposed pavilion will only enhance its beauty

Special Meeting of the Granville Green Committee/Re: Pavilion Project

We have been looking into a timber frame pavilion for our Town Green. Bob Gleason presented his findings to the group. He went over all the figures for design, excavation, foundation, granite piers, timber frame construction, roof decking and crane. At this point he had no information for electrical (wiring and lights), exterior preservative, or repairs to the current pad due to foundation construction demolition. The high estimate was \$72,000.00 and the low estimate is \$51,000.00. Joe B spoke up and said his costs would run \$2,500.00 - \$3,000.00 for the electrical work. That includes running conduit and wire under the walkway, and snaking wire up through the granite piers and wood timbers for outlets and overhead lighting. Bob recommends hiring Jack Soban, the timber frame architect and Neil Godden, the head of the Hartwood School, to do a site visit which would cost about \$500. He would meet all of us there and assess the location and proposed placement of the pavilion. He can then make up a drawing that we can use for fundraising purposes, using the proper specs. We all felt this was a priced action to take, given Jack comes so highly recommended.

The proposal was a unanimous consensus of all members and citizens present that we continue with the pavilion project and start by having a site visit by Jack. Bob will call him to set up a time for him to visit our Green.


### Easter Egg Hunt!



#### **2021 Annual Report**

#### **Chief of Police**

Currently the Granville Police Department has eleven sworn police officers.

Patrol Officers: Ofc Kyle Shoemaker, Ofc Cindi Miller, Ofc Adam Rinko, Ofc John Stone, Ofc Jessica Gower, Ofc Daniel Obrien, Ofc Michael Banas, and Ofc Michael Aubrey.

Chief Rindels is responsible for overseeing the entire police department and its operations. The Chiefs duties include: traffic enforcement, answering calls for service, performing and scheduling cruiser maintenance and repairs, processing all court paperwork, employee payroll, citation processing, and a variety of other functions. He is also serves as a field training officer.

Lieutenant Winslow is responsible to schedule and maintain records for any and all required training for our police officers. He also is responsible for scheduling all patrol shifts, he is the moderator of our police department Facebook page, he is our instructor for firearms and legal updates, and he is also serves a field training officer.

Sergeant Moore is responsible for handling firearms licensing applications and renewals for our residents, he is in charge of our Community Action Team, which assists in helping our at need residents with whatever they may need. Sgt Moore is also our certified sexual assault investigator, and domestic violence investigator. He serves as a field training officer and is the departments Massachusetts Police Association representative.

Officer Rinko is the departments certified Taser instructor, and our CPR and First Responder instructor. He is also the departments grant writer. Since 2018, Officer Rinko has been able to secure grants for the police department in excess \$100,000. Through these grants, we were able to purchase much needed items for our officers including bullet proof vests, tasers, body cameras, an electronic speed monitoring sign, and an enclosed trailer to house and transport our Polaris Ranger UTV rescue vehicle. These grants are crucial in getting the equipment we need to keep our officers safe when performing our jobs. For every dollar we acquire through these grants, it is a significant cost savings to the town.



#### **GRANVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT**

Officer Cindi Miller is our department certified evidence officer. Officer Miller is responsible for logging, storing, and maintaining any and all evidence that results from arrests, motor vehicle accidents, drug confiscations, etc. Officer Miller is also responsible for traffic detail billing and record keeping. She is our department CJIS (Criminal Justice Information System) representative. CJIS is our information system for performing background checks, running license and registration checks, and warrant information etc. Officer Miller was also recently certified as a sexual assault investigator, and domestic violence investigator.

Officer Dan Obrien is our court liaison officer. Officer Obrien handles all traffic and magistrate hearings at Westfield District Court.

Each year our officers are required to attend In-Service training which includes recertification in firearms, taser, defensive tactics (self-defense), legal updates, motor vehicle laws, CPR & first responder, and domestic violence training. This training is funded through the department training budget.

Our department cruiser fleet currently consists of a 2021 Dodge Ram pickup marked patrol unit, a 2018 Dodge Charger unmarked (Chief's car), a 2016 Chevrolet Tahoe marked patrol unit, and a 2013 Dodge Charger marked patrol unit. The 2013 charger is used as a traffic detail car, as well as a spare marked patrol vehicle when another cruiser is out of service for repairs. On the weekends when our call volume is higher, we have two officers on patrol, each in their own cruiser. This allows our officers to respond to calls for service more quickly, as we split up the patrol area to the east and west sides of town. Officers also back each other up.

A few years ago, we started our annual Granville Police Association car show and family day. This community event is our biggest fundraiser for The Granville Police Association. Our Police Officers and Police Explorers volunteer for this event each year. We raise funds and accept donations each year for our association to help support our Police Officers and their families in their time of need. The association also supports and hands out scholarships for our students. The association has also helped needy Granville families during the holidays when they need a little extra help during hard times. We truly appreciate the generous donations we receive each year from our residents. Because of your generosity, we are able to help out those in need.

The Granville Police Department has grown over the years into a professional organization that provides seven day a week police coverage from early morning, until late in the evening. In the event there is not a Granville police officer available, calls will be answered by the Mass State Police by dialing 911. The Granville Police Department would like to thank our Granville residents for their continued support.

#### Granville's Prison and Sheriff

A little piece of History by Marjorie Bloomberg (1919 – 2012)

In the cellar of brick house on the corner of Beech Hill Road and Main Road in West Granville, there is a prison used by Sheriff John Phelps in the 1700's. The house has chains in the cellar that kept prisoners overnight and then taken to Springfield, Massachusetts prison. People who couldn't pay their debts were there. I've heard prisoners of the Revolutionary War were also imprisoned there. My husband Carl was an electrician and worked in that cellar and said the chains were still there and it was kinda spooky.

Most of the rooms in this house are very historical and have many beautiful fireplaces in them. It definitely is a very antique house with beautiful wood work and doorways. This house was built earlier than mine probably early 1700's, mine was built in 1800 and has king's lumber, axe hewn beams overhead in two rooms and put together with wooden pegs. (red house just before Town Hall going East). No doubt their house was built in the same fashion.

John Phelps was born in 1768 and appointed our Sheriff in 1812 – 1813 as he practiced his law in West Granville. James Cooley was our lawyer for East Granville (Granville Center) and he lived in the small house (Martha LaCrosse lives there now) left of the Johnson's (1800 house) he also had his office there. Patrick Baris studied law under John Phelps and also practiced in West Granville. John Phelps wore a uniform in 1845 and a dress sword, brass buttons covered his buff colored vest, silk hat and cockade. He traveled around in a fine coach befitting the "first gentleman of the county". He was a large man, grey hair and well cut features with a voice in proportion to his endowments. He was abrupt and loud and prompt to maintain order but always kind and courteous, but in court demanded order.

He married Betsy Baris in Blandford in 1792. He was always interested in public affairs being Town Clerk 10 years and represented Granville in court. He was a member of the General Court for two years, when Hampden County was determined just before War of 1812. In 1819 – 1841 John Phelps had a Blacksmith Shop at Granville Corners where Lillian Gaines used to live (house between Library and Post Office). Lillian Gaines was John Phelps granddaughter.

The Meeting House was used as a Baptist Church before the Baptist Church was built at the Granville Corners. The Meeting House was moved across the street and sold to the Noble's,

later owed by the Vecchios, then the Falcetti Family, now owned by Pam Woods.

John Phelps sold the land for the West Granville Church and Academy for \$5.00 and deeded it in 1850.

I can't find out if during the Revolutionary War the prison was used for prisoners, maybe somebody knows. I recall the house with the prison in the cellar referred to as the "French House".
