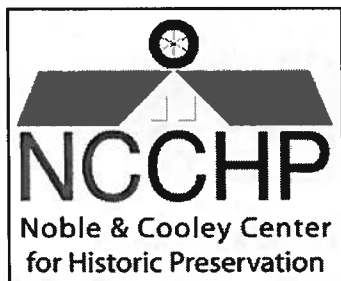

Many old artifacts are on display including a shipping trunk and wooden shoes as well as many pictures of the early Danish families. 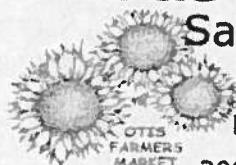

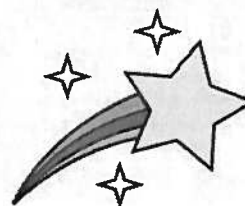

IN YOUR GARDEN NOW

August into September is a transitional period – August being a rather quiet time in your garden – however, keep the weeding up. You will be much happier next spring.

Planting begins again in the autumn as the cooler weather approaches. Pruning will be the major maintenance that will continue in this season. September is the month to get back into planting.

Division and transplanting of spring and summer perennials is accomplished easier as the days begin to cool down. Try to finish by month end to establish plants before winter. Continue to order bulbs for autumn planting. Peonies, poppies and bearded iris are best planted by mid-September.

Again – weed, weed, and weed! No more fertilizer should be added to the plants/gardens. Continue to cut back faded summer perennials as needed to help your garden look its best.

September into October is your time to complete any plantings – usually October 15th is the very latest for perennials.

We have two dates for soil testing in Granville at the Town Hall: September 20th (9 AM – 12 Noon) and October 11th (9AM to 12 Noon). Dig approx 4 - 6 inches into the soil/garden you wish to have tested and scoop up a handful, place it in a baggie. Mark where it came from in your area on the baggie and what you have planted there or wish to plant. We will test the PH level of your soil. If you wish a more comprehensive testing we will direct you to the U of Mass soil testing program.

Granville's Right To Farm By-Laws

Section 1 Legislative purpose and Intent

The purpose and intent of this By-Law is to state with emphasis the Right to Farm accorded to all citizens of the Commonwealth under Article 97, of the Constitution, and all state statutes and regulations thereunder including but not limited to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40A, Section 3, Paragraph 1; Chapter 90, Section 9; Chapter 111, Section 125A, and Chapter 128, Section 1A. We the citizens of Granville restate and republish these rights pursuant to the Town's authority conferred by Article 89 of the Articles of Amendment of the Massachusetts Constitution, ("Home Rule Amendment"). This General By-Law encourages the pursuit of agriculture, promotes agriculture-based economic opportunities, and protects farmlands within the Town of Granville by allowing agricultural uses and related activities to function with minimal conflict with abutters and Town agencies. This By-law shall apply to all jurisdictional areas within the Town.

Section 2 Definitions

The word "farm" shall include any parcel or contiguous parcels of land, or water bodies used for the primary purpose of commercial, agriculture, or accessory thereto.

The word "farming" or "agriculture" or their derivatives shall include, but not be limited to the following:

- *farming in all its branches and the cultivation and tillage of the soil;
- *dairying;
- *production, cultivation, growing, and harvesting of any agricultural, aquacultural, floricultural, viticultural, or horticultural commodities;
- *growing and harvesting of forest products upon forest land, and any other forestry or lumbering operations;
- *raising of livestock including but not limited to horses, poultry, swine, cattle, rarities (such as emus, ostriches, and rheas) and camelids (such as llamas and camels), and other domesticated animals for food and other agricultural purposes, including bees and fur-bearing animals.

"Farming" shall encompass activities including, but not limited to, the following:

- *operation and transportation of slow-moving farm equipment over roads within the Town;
- *control of pests, including, but not limited to, insects, weeds, predators and disease organisms of plants and animals;
- *application of manure, fertilizers, and pesticides;
- *conducting agriculture-related educational and farm-based recreational activities, including agri-tourism, provided that the activities are related to marketing the agricultural output or services of the farm;
- *processing and packaging of the agricultural output of the farm and the operation of a farmer's market or farm stand including signage thereto;
- *maintenance, repair, or storage of seasonal equipment, or apparatus owned or leased by the farm owner or manager used expressly for the purpose of propagation, processing, management, or sale of the agricultural products; and
- *on-farm relocation of earth and the clearing of ground for farming operations.

Section 3 Right To Farm Declaration

The Right To Farm is hereby recognized to exist within the Town of Granville. The above-described agricultural activities may occur on holidays, weekdays, and weekends by night or day and shall include the attendant incidental noise, odors, dust, and fumes associated with normally accepted agricultural practices. It is hereby determined that whatever impact may be caused to others through the normal practice of agriculture is more than offset by the benefits of farming to the neighborhood, community, and society in general. The benefits and protections of this By-Law are intended to apply exclusively to those commercial agricultural and farming operations and activities conducted in accordance with generally acceptable agricultural practices. Moreover, nothing in this Right-To-Farm By-Law shall be deemed as acquiring any

interest in land, or as imposing any land use regulation, which is properly the subject of state statute, regulation, or local zoning law.

Section 4 Disclosure Notification

Not later than 21 days after the purchase and sale contract is entered into, or prior to the sale or exchange of real property if no purchase and sale agreement exists, for the purchase or exchange of real property, or prior to the acquisition of a leasehold interest or other possessory interest in real property, located in the Town of Granville, the landowner shall present the buyer or occupant with a copy of this By-Law.

A copy of this By-Law and an attached form acknowledging receipt of the By-Law prepared by the Town shall be given and shall be signed by the landowner prior to the sale, purchase, exchange, or occupancy of such real property. A copy of the signed form acknowledging receipt of the By-Law must be filed with the Selectboard prior to the sale, purchase, exchange, or occupancy of such real property. A copy of the signed form will be made by the Selectboard and returned to the purchaser. In addition to the above, a copy of this By-Law shall be published once a year in the local paper.

A violation of Section 4 shall be subject to a fine of \$300 and shall be enforced by the Selectboard or its designee. The Town is authorized to enforce Section 4 under the noncriminal disposition provision of G.L. c. 40, ~ 21D.

Section 5 Resolution of Disputes

Any person who seeks to complain about the operation of a farm may, notwithstanding pursuing any other available remedy, file a grievance with the Selectboard, the Zoning Enforcement Officer, or the Board of Health, depending upon the nature of the grievance. The filing of the grievance does not suspend the time within which to pursue any other available remedies that the aggrieved may have. The Zoning Enforcement Officer or Selectboard may

forward a copy of the grievance to the Agricultural Commission or its agent, which shall review and facilitate the resolution of the grievance, and report its recommendations to the referring Town authority within an agreed upon time frame.

The Board of Health, except in cases of imminent danger or public health risk, may forward a copy of the grievance to the Agricultural Commission or its agent, which shall review and facilitate the resolution of the grievance, and report its recommendations to the Board of Health within an agreed upon time frame.

Section 6 Severability Clause

If any part of this By-Law is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the remainder of this By-Law. The Town of Granville hereby declares the provisions of this By-Law to be severable.

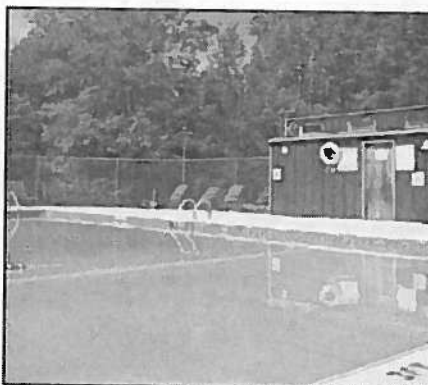

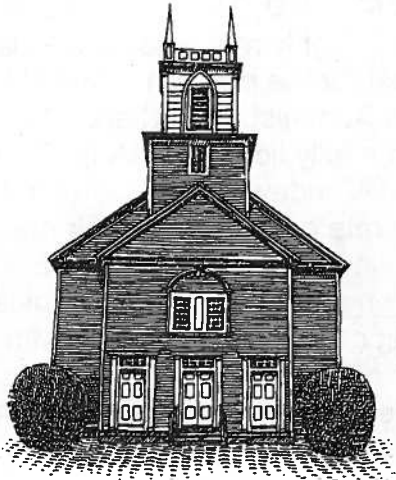
