Sweet Potato Casserole

5 lbs. sweet potatoes (or yams)

4 large eggs

3 tbsp. maple syrup

2 tbsp. vanilla extract

1 tbsp. lemon juice

2 tsp salt

Streusel topping:

1 cup packed brown sugar

¹/₂ cup chopped pecans

¼ cup chilled butter, cut into pieces

2 tsp cinnamon

Mix together streusel topping in a small bowl until mixture is grainy and comes together. Cover and chill until ready to use.

Wrap each potato in foil and bake @ 400 for about 1 hour, or until potatoes are easily pierced by fork and very soft. (or you can peel, and cut into cubes and boil in water until soft and drain) Let cool enough to handle; remove skins and mash potatoes well in a large bowl

In a separate bowl beat eggs, maple syrup, vanilla, lemon juice and salt. Pour mixture over the sweet potatoes, mix until smooth and incorporated. Transfer mixture into a buttered 9 x 13 baking dish.

Sprinkle pecan topping evenly over casserole. Bake a@ 350 until casserole is set and topping bubbles. About 1 hour (source: Chew out loud, inspired by Bon Appetit)

Census

The Town Clerk's Office will be sending out the 2018 Annual Census forms by mail mid-January. Per Massachusetts General Law, census forms must be mailed to street addresses. If you have your mail sent to a post office box and do not receive a form, call or stop in for a form to complete.

Dog Licenses

The census package will also include a dog license application for those dog owners who sometimes forget to license their dog. The board is also required under state statute to prepare a listing of dogs owned by each resident. All dogs that are six months of age or older must be licensed annually under M.G.L. Ch. 140. An updated proof of rabies vaccination is required prior to licensing as well as proof of spaying and neutering. Incomplete applications will be returned to the sender.

Nomination Papers

Nomination papers for candidates running for town offices will be available at the Town Clerk's office beginning January 2, 2018, for the annual town election to be held April 9, 2018.

Candidates for town office must obtain at least 30 signatures of registered voters town wide. The last day to file nomination papers with the Board of Registrars is February 26, 2018.

The following slates of office will be on the April 9, 2018 ballot:

one member of the Selectboard for three years;

one Moderator for one year;

one Assessor for three years;

one Town Clerk for three years;

one Library Trustee for three years;

one member of the Regional School Committee for three years;

one Constable for three years;

two members of the Planning Board for three years; and

five members of the Recreation Committee for three years.

If any resident has questions pertaining to the census form, the dog license form or nomination paper you may call the Town Clerk's office for assistance. Forms may be returned by mail or hand delivered to the Town Clerk's office.

Notary Public

The Town Clerk, as well as the Town Administrator/Matt Streeter are Notaries Public. If you need our services, please call either of us and make an appointment. The service is free of charge to Granville residents.



Mail Theft

The town of Granville is currently experiencing a large amount of mailbox thefts. In the computer age, we understand we have to be careful answering emails and phone calls due to the rise in scams. However, we easily forget about our mailboxes. The Granville Police Department would like to remind residents that your personal identity is largely housed in your mailbox. The Federal Trade Commission estimates 400,000 Americans have had their mail, and their identities, stolen.

While the police try to protect your property, we can't do the job alone. The town of Granville has hundreds of mail deliveries daily so you, the community, need to take part in the overall security of your mail. The following are some security measures that are suggested by the U.S. Postal Service:

Use the letter slots inside your Post Office for your mail, or hand it to a letter carrier.

Pick up your mail promptly after delivery. Don't leave it in your mailbox overnight. If you're expecting checks, credit cards, or other negotiable items, ask a trusted friend or neighbor to pick up your mail.

If you don't receive a check or other valuable mail you're expecting, contact the issuing agency immediately.

Don't send cash in the mail.

Tell your Post Office when you'll be out of town, so they can hold your mail until you return.

Report all suspected mail theft to a Postal Inspector.

Consider starting a neighborhood watch program. By exchanging work and vacation schedules with trusted friends and neighbors, you can watch each other's mailboxes (as well as homes).

Consult with your local Postmaster for the most up-to-date regulations on mailboxes, including the availability of locked centralized or curbside mailboxes.

If you see a mail thief at work, or if you suspect your mail was stolen, call the police immediately.

Upcoming Town Hall Meetings

The Granville Police Department is announcing two upcoming Town Hall meetings scheduled for 2017 & 2018. The first meeting will be December 19th at 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. The second meeting will be March 20, 2018 at 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

The Granville Police Department will present crime trends, statistics and new strategies being employed. Attendees will meet with the Chief so they can share their concerns about the Police Department and policing in general. We will also share Police Department volunteer opportunities with community crime watch programs and community event information. The goal is to create an opportunity for the citizens of Granville to voice their concerns openly and free of criticism. The meeting will progress to allow attendees to propose what they believe should be the priorities for their neighborhoods. It is an excellent time to get to know the law enforcement officers working in your neighborhoods and help direct the activity of the Police Department in the coming year.

The Granville Fire Department wants to keep you safe this heating season!

Christmas Tree and Light Safety – It's that time of year again! Many of us will be decorating inside and outside of our homes. Here are some reminders to keep you safe!

- Keep trees away from heat sources.
- Water a cut tree daily and use a "non-tip" style tree stand.
- Never leave a lit tree unattended if you leave the house, turn off the lights.
- Dispose of your tree properly, soon after the holiday, before the needles dry out.
- Unplug all lighting before retiring for the evening
- or leaving the house.
- Purchase lights and electric decorations which are listed by an approved testing agency such as Underwriters Laboratory (UL).
- Check all lighting for frayed wires, broken plugs, sockets, etc.
- Never overload outlets. Use no more than three strands of lights on a single extension cord.
- Consider buying new energy efficient LED lights that don't get as hot.
- Always use appropriate weatherproof lights outdoors.

Candle Safety - In 2015, candles caused 105 fires, three civilian deaths, nine civilian injuries, five firefighter injuries and an estimated dollar loss of \$3.9 million in damages. Of the 84 candle fires in homes, 35% occurred in the bedroom. It is all too easy to fall asleep and leave a candle burning unattended in the bedroom. Remember to blow out candles before leaving a room or going to bed.

- Burn candles within a one-foot circle, free of anything that can burn.
- Before you go out, blow it out; never leave candles burning unattended.
- Always extinguish candles after use.
- Use a non-combustible saucer or candleholder.
- Candles used to heat oils
- Keep candles out of reach of children and pets.

Together, we can improve the life safety and wellbeing of our Granville residents!

HOUSING REHABILITATION ASSISTANCE

SOUTHWICK * GRANVILLE

If you do **you may be eligible for up to \$40,000** in grants for making necessary repairs to your home. Home improvements may include chimney and foundation repair, lead paint and asbestos removal, roof repair and replacement, window installation, plumbing, heating, electrical, weatherization and handicapped accessibility. Grant funds can also be utilized for septic system repair or replacement. These towns have collaborated in successfully obtaining Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding to assist income eligible residents. The Pioneer Valley Planning Commission (PVPC), located in Springfield, has been hired to help administer the Housing Rehabilitation program. The PVPC provides assistance with the application process and helps coordinate the construction process.

CALL NOW if you need to make improvements to eliminate building code violations, eliminate unsafe or unhealthy conditions, improve weatherization or undertake other necessary work to improve the quality of your living conditions. All information received is confidential and will be maintained in the Springfield office of the PVPC. WINTER ROADS POLICY 2017-2018 In effect from November 1 - to April 30

- On-street parking is prohibited. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.
- Parking at the Town Hall, Library, or school is restricted to those doing Town business during business hours.
- During winter road operations, main roads are a priority. Therefore, Route 57, Route 189, and Old Westfield Road will be cleared first.
- Town Roads with low use may be closed for the winter.
- Depositing snow on a Town road is prohibited.
- Plowing snow across a Town road is prohibited.
- "All season" tires are not a substitute for snow tires.
- High quality snow tires are essential.
- Limit travel during storm events.
- Drive below the posted speed.
- Be aware of changing road conditions, flurries, and frost. Shaded areas become hazardous rapidly. An isolated weather event will create hazardous conditions. Notorious for this are the Gorge, Hairpin Turn, the North end of Old Westfield Road, and Water Street by the Transfer Station.

Town of Granville Transfer Station

Open Tuesdays 1 PM – 5 PM

& Saturdays 9 AM – 5 PM

The Town of Granville Transfer Station uses the punch card system for residents to dispose of household trash. Trash bags are sold in various sizes by the gallon. The four punch card sizes are sold in accordance with the most popular plastic trash bag sizes: 13 gallons, 30 gallons, 42 gallons and 50 gallons.

All cards cost \$75.00, and are based on \$.09 per gallon of trash placed in the compactor. The price has not increased, and is the same price per gallon for all bag sizes.

We ask that you buy the card that corresponds with the trash bag size you use. Please put all trash in a tied bag. It is *extremely* important that all trash be in a secured bag.

Loose trash causes problems with maintaining the compactors, safely transporting the trash, and sanitation of the transfer station. By using the bag size that corresponds with the card you purchase, it allows us to be fair to everyone and correctly charge for the volume each person brings.

Punch cards are available for purchase at the Transfer Station during hours of operation. Please make checks payable to the Town of Granville.

For most, this is how business has always been done at the Transfer Station and we thank you for your cooperation. Please help us continue our operation of the Transfer Station as a clean and organized enterprise by following the rules outlined above. More information on the facility operations and recycling program can be found on the Granville Town Website Transfer Station page.





Additional meetings will be held as necessary and will be posted.



This year the Town collected approx. \$18,900.00 from the 1 1/2% real estate surcharge and has received matching funds of \$ 3,559.00.

The CPC is now accepting applications for projects in the 3 areas allowed by the Community Preservation Act (CPA); Historic Preservation, Community Housing and Open Space. Any organization or person considering an application should review the criteria for acceptable project funding before completing an application.

Restoring the American Chestnut Tree to the Eastern Forest of the U.S.

Presented by John Meiklejohn. For centuries the American Chestnut was a majestic and useful giant of the eastern U.S. forest.
