## WINTER ROADS POLICY 2020-2021 In effect from November 1 - to April 30

- On-street parking is prohibited. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.
- Parking at the Town Hall, Library, or School is restricted to those doing Town business during business hours.
- During winter road operations, main roads are a priority.
- Town Roads with low use may be closed for the winter.
- Depositing snow on a Town road is prohibited.
- Plowing snow across a Town road is prohibited.
- "All season" tires are not a substitute for snow tires.
- High quality snow tires, preferably studded, are essential for winter driving.
- Limit travel during storm events.
- Drive below the posted speed.
- Be aware of changing road conditions, flurries, and frost. Shaded areas become hazardous rapidly. An isolated weather event will create hazardous conditions. Notorious for this are the Gorge and Hairpin Turn on Route 57, the North end of Old Westfield Road, and Water Street by the Transfer Station.

The Community Preservation Committee (CPC) is opening the 2021 grant cycle.

Applications and criteria for Community Preservation Funding can be found on-line at townofgranville.net or can be obtained from Richard Pierce, CPC chair by contacting rnpierce@comcast.net.

The CPC will be meeting on the 3rd Wednesday of January & February to answer questions from potential applicants and the public and to vote on applications received by the deadline of January 31, 2021.

The meetings on January 20, February 17 and, if needed, March 17 will be held at Town Hall at 7 pm. The meetings will be held in the Main Hall with appropriate safety precautions and masking required. We are working to plan for on-line participation as well. Contact Matt Streeter, Town Administrator, at Town Hall or Richard Pierce (above) for information during the 2nd week of January for information on the appropriate links.

Community Preservation Act funds are available for projects associated with Historic Preservation, Community Housing and Open Space Preservation. Submitted proposals that meet the state-mandated CPA criteria will be reviewed by the Granville CPC and voted upon by the committee to bring to the Annual Town Meeting for a community vote.

# The Granville Fire Department has some reminders:

Below are a few tips and reminders to help keep you and your family safe.

## Seconds Count in an Emergency

- Protect your family and your property by having large visible house numbers.
- Firefighters, police officers, and paramedics find you faster when your home is properly marked.
- A visitor, child or injured person may be unable to give clear directions.
- Emergency personnel from a neighboring community may be unfamiliar with your area.

## **Use Large Visible Numbers**

• Numbers need to be at least 4-inches in height and facing the street.

- Put the numbers under lighting, and use numbers with a contrasting background, so they will be visible at night.
- If your driveway is long, post your house number on both sides of a mailbox or sign pole at the end of the driveway near the road.
- Be sure to keep numbers visible by trimming trees, bushes and flowers.
- You can visit the Granville fire Department webpage to purchase green reflective numbered signs for your property.

## Census:

The Town Clerk's Office will be sending out the 2021 Annual Census forms by mail mid/late January. Per Massachusetts General Law, census forms must be mailed to street addresses. If you have your mail sent to a post office box and do not receive a form call to be mailed a form to complete.

## Dog Licenses:

The census package will also include a dog license application for dog owners to license their dog(s). All dogs that are six months of age or older must be licensed annually under M.G.L. Ch. 140. An updated proof of rabies vaccination is required prior to licensing as well as proof of spaying and neutering.

## Nomination Papers:

Nomination papers for candidates running for town offices will be available at the Town Clerk's office beginning January 4, 2021, for the annual town election to be held April 12, 2021. If you wish to run for a position within our municipality in April, please call my office and we can either meet via appointment or I can mail you a nomination paper for completion.

Candidates for town office must obtain at least 30 signatures of registered voters town wide. The last day to file nomination papers with the Board of Registrars will be March 1, 2021.

The following slates of office will be on the April 12, 2021 ballot:

- one member of the Selectboard for three years;
- one Moderator for one year;
- one Assessor for three years;
- one Town Clerk for three years;
- one Library Trustee for three years;
- one member of the Regional School Committee for three years;
- one Constable for three years;
- two members of the Planning Board for three years; and
- five members of the Recreation Committee for three years.

If any resident has questions pertaining to the census form, the dog license form or nomination paper you may call my office for assistance. Forms may be returned by mail or hand delivered to the drop box at the Town Hall addressed to my attention.
