

Census

The Town Clerk's office has sent out the 2017 Annual Census forms. Please respond within 10 days of receiving your form. Per Massachusetts General Law, census forms must be mailed to street addresses. If you have your mail sent to a post office box and did not receive a form, call or stop in for a form to complete.

Dog Licenses

The census package will also include a dog license application for dog owners on record to license their dog. For first time licensing of your dog(s), you may go to the Town web site and print a form to complete. You may also call, request a form via mail, email or stop by the Town Hall. All dogs that are six months of age or older must be licensed annually under M.G.L. Ch. 140. An updated proof of rabies vaccination is required prior to licensing as well as proof of spaying and neutering. Incomplete applications will be returned to the sender.

Nomination Papers

Nomination papers for candidates running for town offices are available at the Town Clerk's office for any town voter wishing to run during the annual town election to be held April 10, 2017.

Candidates for town office must obtain at least 30 signatures of registered voters town wide. The last day to file nomination papers with the Board of FRegistrars is February 22, 2017.

The following slates of office will be on the April ballot: one selectman for three years, one moderator for one year, one assessor for three years, one library trustee for three years, one constable for three years, two members of the planning board for three years, one tax collector for three years and one treasurer for three years.

If any resident has questions pertaining to the census form, the dog license form or nomination paper you may call the town clerk's office for assistance. Forms may be returned by mail or hand delivered to the town clerk's office.

Winter Roads Policy 2016-17

Town of Granville, MA
In effect from November 1 - to April 30
Doug Roberts Superintendent of Public Works

- On-street parking is prohibited. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.
- During winter road operations, main roads are first priority therefore, Main Road, Granby Road and Old Westfield Road will be cleared first.
- Depositing snow on a Town road is prohibited.
- Plowing snow across a Town road is prohibited.
- Granville is the source of drinking water therefor we limit the use of salt.
- Drive below the posted speed.
- High quality snow tires are essential.
- Allocate more time for travel.
- Town Roads with low use patterns may be closed for winter maintenance.
- During winter weather limit travel, to essential trips only.
- Be aware of changing road conditions, flurries, morning frost and shaded areas become slippery rapidly, an isolated weather event often causes slippery conditions in one area or curve. Notorious for this are the Gorge, Hairpin Turn, the north end of Old Westfield Road, Water Street at the Transfer station corners.
- Communicate with inexperienced drivers a clear understanding of all the dangers involved in winter driving.

"The Veteran" is displayed in the hall of the Holyoke Veterans Home.


WHAT'S COOKING

Ginger Cookies 1 cup Crisco 1/s cup hot water 1 cup sugar 1 cup molasses 1 tbls. Baking soda 1 egg ■ 1 tbsp. ground ginger 6 cups sifted flour 1 tbsp. cinnamon Cream crisco, sugar and egg. Add ginger and cinnamon, mix well. Mix hot water, molasses and baking soda, add with flour to creamed sugar mixture, mix well. Divide dough into three parts. Roll out each part on a floured board to ¼ inch thick, cut with cookie cutters.

Bake on a greased cookie sheet at 375 for 10

to 12 minutes or until your finger leaves a slight impression. Do not over bake, cool on a






OBITUARY
