WINTER ROADS POLICY 2022-2023 In effect from November 1 - to April 30

- On-street parking is prohibited. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.
- Parking at the Town Hall, Library, or School is restricted to those doing Town business during business hours.
- During winter road operations, main roads are a priority.
- Town Roads with low use may be closed for the winter.
- Depositing snow on a Town road is prohibited.
- Plowing snow across a Town road is prohibited.
- "All season" tires are not a substitute for snow tires.
- High quality snow tires, preferably studded, are essential for winter driving.
- Limit travel during storm events.
- Drive below the posted speed.
- Be aware of changing road conditions, flurries, and frost. Shaded areas become hazardous rapidly. An isolated weather event will create hazardous conditions. Notorious for this are the Gorge and Hairpin Turn on Route 57, the North end of Old Westfield Road, and Water Street by the Transfer Station.

Census:

The Town Clerk's Office will be sending out the 2023 Annual Census forms by mail mid/late January. Per Massachusetts General Law, census forms must be mailed to street addresses. If you have your mail sent to a post office box and do not receive a form call to be mailed a form to complete.

Dog Licenses:

The census package will also include a dog license application for dog owners to license their dog(s). All dogs that are six months of age or older must be licensed annually under M.G.L. Ch. 140. An updated proof of rabies vaccination is required prior to licensing as well as proof of spaying and neutering.

Nomination Papers:

Nomination papers for candidates running for town offices will be available at the Town Clerk's office for the annual town election to be held Monday, April 10, 2023. If you wish to run for a position within our municipality in April, please call the office and we can either meet via appointment or I can mail you a nomination paper for completion.

Incumbent officer holders must submit nomination papers by February 18, 2023. New candidates for town offices must obtain at least 30 signatures of registered voters town wide. The last day to file nomination papers with the Board of Registrars will be March 7, 2023 at 5:00PM.

The following slates of office will be on the April 10, 2023 ballot:

one member of the Selectboard for three years; one Moderator for one year; one Assessor for three years; one Library Trustee for three years; one Constable for three years; one Tax Collector for three years; one Treasurer for three years; two members of the Planning Board for three years each

If any resident has questions pertaining to the census form, the dog license form or nomination papers, you may call Town Clerk's office for assistance. Forms can be returned by mail or to the drop box at the Town Hall addressed to the attention of the Town Clerk.



NURSE HOUR AT GRANVILLE TOWN HALL

Tricia Sedelow, BSN RN, is the Regional Public Health Nurse from the Southwick Board of Health serving the towns of Granville, Southwick and Tolland. Tricia will begin to hold monthly "Nurse Hour" for blood pressure checks, health education and to answer questions or concerns. No appointments are needed.

The Nurse Hour sessions will be located in the Granville Town Hall, 707 Main Road, beginning in February. The schedule is as follows:

<u>First Thursday</u> of each month from 10:00am to 11:00am starting **February 2, 2023** <u>Third Thursday</u> of each month from 3:00pm to 4:00pm starting **February 16, 2023**

Also, the nurse will hold an office hour at the Granville Library, 2 Granby Road, monthly on the <u>Second Thursday</u> of each month from 3:30pm to 4:30pm starting **February 9, 2023** (All dates are weather dependent).

FIREWinter Safety Tips from the Granville

While we have a fairly mild winter this year there is still an opportunity through the months of February, March and even early April for us to encounter winter weather. That is why we would like to provide you with some ways you can better prepare yourself for the cold and snow.

- The first tip is it is imperative that you ensure that your carbon monoxide and smoke detectors are in working order. With woodstoves, pellet stoves and other heating sources being used during cold weather, these two devices are your first line of defense in the event of a malfunction. Proper working smoke detectors and CO detectors can alert you to a problem before you even know you have one.
- Our second tip for you this winter is to create and store an emergency kit in your car. This can contain items such as a flashlight, first aid items (band aids, heat packs, etc..), a portable cell phone charger, non-perishable foods, and anything else you may need in the event you get stuck in a storm. Living in a rural town could mean extended periods of time between the roads being plowed and limited accessibility for a tow truck in the event you get stuck. You should always be prepared for the unexpected.
- The third tip for you this winter is to take periodic breaks when shoveling snow so as to not put unnecessary stress on your body. The combination of the cold weather and the high energy exertion can lead to several types of medical emergencies such as pulled muscles, hurt backs, and in severe cases heart attacks. If you are able to give your body a break from shoveling, we highly recommend you do so.
- Our final tip to you this winter is to check on your neighbors. Granville is a small-town rural community. If you know your neighbor has medical concerns or issues with heat, don't be afraid to reach out and offer help in a time of need. We pride ourselves on being a close-knit community and that's because of our willingness to help others when help is needed. Its one of the many things to love about this town and I know you all will continue to keep that small town feeling alive.

While these are not the only tips for keeping you safe and prepared this winter, we feel these are some of the important ones that can keep you relatively prepared in any situations. We hope that everyone stays warm and safe during these colder months of the year and we look forward to interacting with the wonderful residents of Granville at various events this spring and summer. Phone-based scams are on the rise across the country. While most of these scams target elderly victims, it is not uncommon for victims of any age to be taken advantage of. These scammers are often from other parts of the country, or even the world, and tracking them is difficult at best. Many will attempt to steal your money, but others could target your personal information or even your home. These scammers are very good at what they do and have tricked people of every age and background. Normally they will know something specific about you to trick you into believing they are legitimate. They will be aggressive to get what they want, they may threaten you with fines or loss of funds. They may say that someone is going to come to your home, work, or find you in person.

While the number of scams is growing daily, there are some general steps you can take to protect yourself:

- Register your phone number with the National Do Not Call Registry. You may register online or by calling 1-888-382-1222 (TTY: 1-866-290-4236). If you still receive telemarketing calls after registering, there's a good chance that the calls are scams.
- Be wary of callers claiming that you've won a prize or vacation package. Many of these scams will request that you send a "fee" to release the money.
- If something doesn't seem right, hang up on the phone call. You can always check out their request and call them back if you determine it to be legitimate.
- Be cautious of caller ID. Scammers can change the phone number that shows up on your caller ID screen. They may even show up as your own number, or that of someone you know. This is called "spoofing" and is extremely easy to do.
- Independently research any business opportunities, charities, or travel packages that the caller offers.
- Don't give in to pressure to take immediate action. Take some time to do your own research and ask a trusted friend or family member.
- Don't say anything if a caller starts the call asking, "Can you hear me?" This is a common tactic for scammers to record you saying "yes." Scammers record your "yes" response and use it as proof that you agreed to a purchase or credit card charge.

- Don't provide your credit card number, bank account information, or other personal information to a caller.
- Even if a caller has some of your personal information, such as birthdate, social security number or banking info, it does not mean they are from a legitimate organization. This information can be bought by scammers and used to fool you into trusting them.
- If a caller claims that they are from a government organization, you should look up the number online or in a phone book and call back. Do not ask them for a call back number. This will help ensure you are speaking to the actual organization.
- If a caller states that you or a loved one are in legal trouble, or had some kind of medical issue, and needs money, hang up and call your local Police Department. They will be able to determine if the situation is legitimate and help you respond if needed.
- Never send payment in the form of gift cards. Also, never wire or transfer money until you are 100% sure where that money is going.
- If you believe you have been scammed, immediately notify your local Police Department, bank, and credit card companies. They can help place a "Fraud Alert" on your accounts and will contact you if something doesn't seem right on your account.

Many blessings of peace and good health this year. My door is always open and I look forward to seeing you in 2023!






