## Dump Master Bob Laptew Is Retiring

Bob has been a regular face at the Transfer Station for ten years. Always pleasant, always helpful, always taking the extra time to make your Transfer Station experience pleasant. Unfortunately all good things come to an end and so Bob has decided to leave us for warmer winters and cooler summers. We wish him well as he enters his second (third?) retirement starting December 31. We will miss you Bob, but wish you the best!

## Single Stream Recycling In Granville... NOW!!!

Recycling has come full circle. Remember how one used to have to separate corrugated cardboard from paste board, green glass from cans (and even glass by color) and no tubs, necked bottles only! Remember? Twenty five years ago Granville dropped off our first recyclables at the Springfield Materials Recycling Facility (SMRF) all separated out. Beginning December 1, Granville will drop off its recyclables at the SMRF all mixed together!

How can this possibly work? We will have the same compactor and box at the Transfer Station where you will place your trash. (Nothing changes with the trash portion of the stream.) We will have another compactor and box at the Transfer Station where you will place the bottles and cans and papers all together. **YOU CAN'T MIX YOUR TRASH WITH YOUR RECYCLABLES**, but **SINGLE STREAM RECYCLING** means **YOU CAN MIX YOUR BOTTLE/CAN MIX AND YOUR PAPER MIX**.

The beauty of single stream recycling is that one does not have to decide if ice cream cartons goes with paper or bottles/cans, or if something made of cardboard with a metal ring goes in paper or bottles/cans and etc. If you know something is recyclable, you don't have to decide which stream to recycle it into.

Don't expect a whole new look at the Transfer Station. The bottle and can box and the paper mix box and the cardboard box will stay on site as we can use them for overflow. You already see two compactors when you dispose of your trash, but one will be trash only and one will be recyclables only. Bob will be there to tell us what to do so it will all flow smoothly. Just remember, it is **Single Stream RECYCLING** not single stream disposal. (Included in the Caller is a reminder sheet from the SMRF of what is recyclable.)

### **BULKY RIGID PLASTICS RECYCLED... NOW!!!**

Granville is excited to offer you an opportunity to rid your trash of **BULKY RIGID PLASTICS** such as clothes baskets, plastic kid's pools, and lawn furniture and so on. This is something **NEW** starting at the SMRF this month! Until the SMRF initiated this program, these items were disposed of in landfills. Now we will collect them at the transfer station. We will take them to the SMRF who will ship them to the Midwest where they will be ground up and made into new plastic items. Enclosed is a fact sheet from Waste Management and the SMRF which explains the program. We believe they will be able to be recycled in the single stream compactor, but we will be testing things out to maximize our compactor space in relation to our trucking frequency. Stay tuned for details!

### **Whether You Use The Transfer Station or Have Curbside Pick-up you must abide by the Granville recycling bylaw and state wide trash bans.**

Twenty five years ago Granville residents passed a bylaw that required all residents to recycle and trash bans were instituted which do not allow for the disposal of hazardous wastes, fluorescent bulbs, mercury thermometers, etc. in the trash. Curb side pick-up vendors are required to provide recycling services and to monitor the trash they collect for adherence with the trash bans.

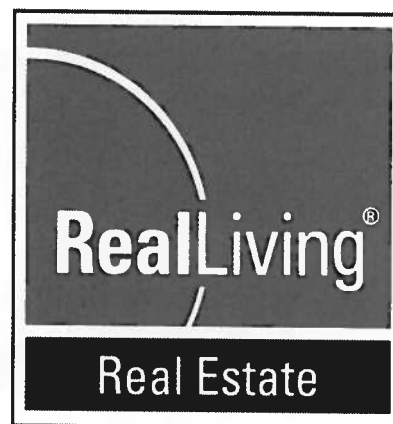
Legislative changes to the Community Preservation Act (CPA) in 2012 now allow for rehabilitation and restoration of open space, recreational land, historic resources and community housing even if the property was not originally acquired or created using CPA funds. This is a more lenient standard than in

the past, which required that the rehab be done only on land purchased with CPA grant money. This allows the CPC to consider funding of a wider range of projects. The same legislative action also will increase matching funds from the State for local CPA projects.

This year our state match is \$ 6,059.00 based on the \$ 19,256.00 the Town collected in property tax surcharges for 2014. This money and the growing balances from past years is available for CPA project funding.

## Cable Committee Meeting with Comcast on Cable License Renewal

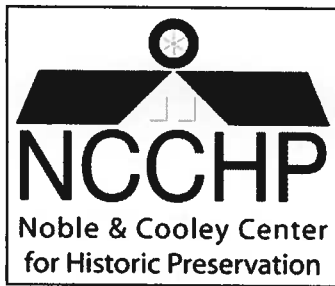

## NCCHP January 2015 Update

Many thanks to everyone who donated to local nonprofits as part of the 3<sup>rd</sup> annual Valley Gives Day! The event was an incredible success and raised over \$2,676,595 in just 24 hours for 463 participating nonprofits in Western Mass. NCCHP placed an amazing 41st out of 186 nonprofits competing in the "most unique donors" category and our 60 generous donors gifted the museum over \$3350 in donations that will enable us to move forward with new living history programs as well as funding infrastructure projects in 2015. In addition, NCCHP won a \$1000 Golden Ticket prize grant near the end of the evening...what a wonderful bonus! Thank you all for your continued support and belief in the museum and our mission, "Keeping the Drumbeat of History"!

Mark your calendars! The 7<sup>th</sup> annual Ice Harvest at the shop pond will be held on Saturday, Feb. 7 from 12 – 3. Dennis Picard, director of Storowton Village Museum, will organize the harvest and invite visitors to join him on the ice to use the ice saw and other tools to experience life before the days of refrigeration. A video on ice harvesting in New England will also be shown continuously in the NCCHP Museum. The rescue horses from the Blue Star Equiculture Farm ([www.equiculture.org](http://www.equiculture.org)) will be back for Ice Harvest again this year. The museum will be open for tours that focus on Yankee Ingenuity from the 1850's to current day. We hope to bring people together to rekindle the community spirit of the farm communities and industrial villages that were common in most of New England. The Noble & Cooley Center for Historic Preservation invites everyone with an interest in "living history" to join us at the museum. There is no charge for the event or for refreshments but

## Winter Roads Policy Town of Granville, MA

On-street parking is prohibited until further notice. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.

During winter road operations, major roads will be a priority, followed by secondary roads, therefore, Main Road, Granby Road and the Old Westfield Road will be cleared first.

Plowing, shoveling, blowing or otherwise depositing snow on Town roads is illegal.

Plowing snow across a Town Road is not allowed

Because Granville is the source of drinking water for several communities it limits the use of salt as a deicer.

When roads are snow covered or icy, residents should limit travel and proceed slowly with extreme caution.

High quality snow tires are essential for safe travel between October 1 and April 30.

Allocate more time for commuting to compensate for slower travel speeds during winter conditions.

Town Roads, or sections thereof, with low use patterns may be closed for winter maintenance. This allows for road clearing resources to be used more efficiently. Alternate routes will be maintained. Holden Hill Road and Wildcat Road will not be maintained and is closed to traffic.

During all winter weather events residents should limit travel to essential trips only.

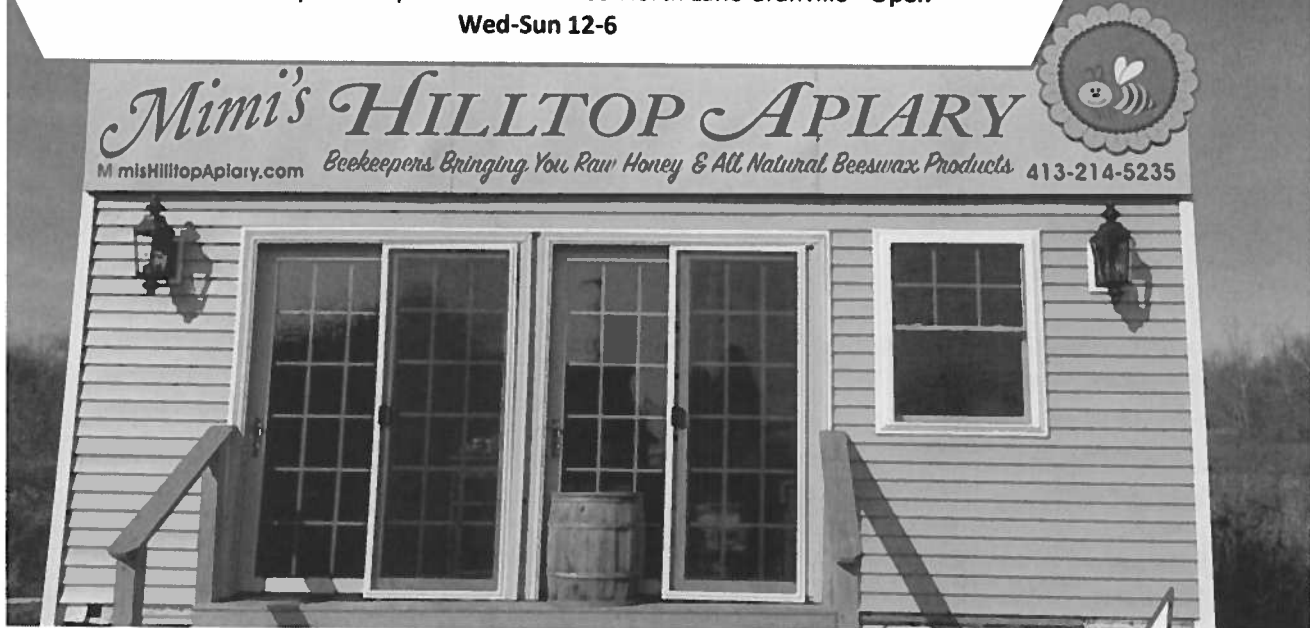

### OPEN BRUSH BURNING – NEW PROCEDURES

All open burning of brush in Massachusetts is regulated by The Massachusetts Air Pollution Control Regulation, 310 CMR 7.07. City and town fire departments are mandated to enforce these regulations on a local level. Pertinent parts of 310 CMR 7.07 are provided with all open burning permits. Please observe these rules and regulations

The 2015 season for open burning of brush is from January 15<sup>th</sup> thru April 30<sup>th</sup>. **Permits are available Monday thru Friday from 9am to 5pm by calling the fire department clerk at 413-357-8585 ext. 9.**

Permits remain free of charge and can be issued in advance of the effective date. If you wish to burn on a weekend you must obtain a permit during the week. When you call to request your permit we will fax or E-Mail it to you. If you do not have access to a fax machine or computer with E-Mail you may arrange to pick up your permit at the town hall during normal business hours.

While burning brush please remember that for a brush fire that becomes unmanageable, or for any other fire emergency, calling 911 early is the best option. The GFD is equipped to quickly bring a fire under control before it spreads and grows in size.

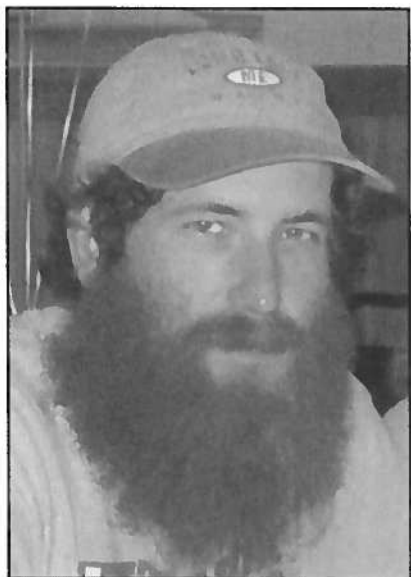
