Census:

The Town Clerk's Office will be sending out the 2018 Annual Census forms by mail mid-January. Per Massachusetts General Law, census forms must be mailed to street addresses. If you have your mail sent to a post office box and do not receive a form, call or stop in for a form to complete.

Dog Licenses:

The census package will also include a dog license application for dog owners to license their dog(s). All dogs that are six months of age or older must be licensed annually under M.G.L. Ch. 140. An updated proof of rabies vaccination is required prior to licensing as well as proof of spaying and neutering.

Nomination Papers:

Nomination papers for candidates running for town offices will be available at the Town Clerk's office beginning January 2, 2018, for the annual town election to be held April 9, 2018.

Candidates for town office must obtain at least 30 signatures of registered voters town wide. The last day to file nomination papers with the Board of Registrars is February 26, 2018.

The following slates of office will be on the April 9, 2018 ballot:

- one member of the Selectboard for three years;
- one Moderator for one year;
- one Assessor for three years;
- one Town Clerk for three years;
- one Library Trustee for three years;
- one member of the Regional School Committee for three years;
- one Constable for three years;
- two members of the Planning Board for three years; and
- five members of the Recreation Committee for three years.

If any resident has questions pertaining to the census form, the dog license form or nomination paper you may call the Town Clerk's office for assistance. Forms may be returned by mail or hand delivered to the Town Clerk's office.

Notary Public:

The Town Clerk, as well as the Town Administrator/Matt Streeter are Notaries Public. If you need our services, please call either of us and make an appointment. The service is free of charge to Granville residents.

CHIMNEY & WOODSTOVE FIRE SAFETY

DEPARTMENT OF FIRE SERVICES

In 2016, there were 565 fire incidents involving chimneys, fireplaces, and woodstoves. These fires were responsible one civilian death, three civilian injuries, and five firefighter injuries. They resulted in \$2.3 million in property losses. These incidents made up 38% of all fires linked to heating systems.

Purchasing

• Be sure the stove you are purchasing to burn wood or coal is approved by Underwriter's Laboratory or another recognized testing laboratory.

Installation

- A building permit must be obtained prior to the installation of fireplaces, wood or coal burning stoves. They must be inspected by the local building inspector prior to their initial use as required by the Massachusetts State Building Code.
- Allow at least 36 inches of space around the appliance to prevent combustibles from coming into contact with a heat source.
- Solid fuel heating appliances cannot share a common flue with chimney flues utilized by other solid fuel, fossil fuel, or gas fired appliances.

Inspections

• Have the chimney and flue inspected by a qualified mason prior to use. Cracks in the flue or mortar joints can allow flames and heated gases to extend into the structure.

Proper Use

- Most chimney fires occur due to a build-up of creosote, a tarry by-product of burning wood. Have your chimney flue cleaned before each heating season. Burn only dry, well-seasoned, hardwood to reduce creosote accumulation.
- Do not use flammable liquids to start the fire.
- Never leave children unattended near the stove.
- Check that the damper is open before lighting the fire. Failure to do so can result in an accumulation of smoke and carbon monoxide within the home. Do not close the damper before the fire has died out and the embers are cold.
- Use a fireplace screen to prevent flying sparks and embers from falling out onto the floor.
- •Install and maintain smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors to provide protection for your family.

Proper Ash Disposal

• Ashes cleaned out from the stove or fireplace should be shoveled into a metal bucket with a metal lid, placed outside, on the ground, away from the building, to prevent fires. Do not place ashes into a paper bag or cardboard box. Ashes and embers can stay hot for days and ignite combustibles.

Carbon Monoxide & Smoke Alarms

- Carbon monoxide alarms are required now in all homes with chimneys or woodstoves. Install one on every habitable level and no more than 10 feet from every bedroom door. Replace every 5-7 years.
- Smoke alarms should be installed on every level of your home, at the bottom of every stairwell and outside each sleeping area. Replace every ten years.
- Test alarms regularly and change alkaline batteries when we change the clocks.
- Consider installing alarms with sealed, 10-year batteries.

Together, we can improve the life safety and wellbeing of our Granville residents!

WINTER ROADS POLICY 2017-2018 In effect from November 1 - to April 30

- On-street parking is prohibited. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.
- Parking at the Town Hall, Library, or school is restricted to those doing Town business during business hours.
- During winter road operations, main roads are a priority. Therefore, Route 57, Route 189, and Old Westfield Road will be cleared first.
- Town Roads with low use may be closed for the winter.
- Depositing snow on a Town road is prohibited.
- Plowing snow across a Town road is prohibited.
- "All season" tires are not a substitute for snow tires.
- High quality snow tires are essential.
- Limit travel during storm events.
- Drive below the posted speed.
- Be aware of changing road conditions, flurries, and frost. Shaded areas become hazardous rapidly.
 An isolated weather event will create hazardous conditions. Notorious for this are the Gorge,
 Hairpin Turn, the North end of Old Westfield Road, and Water Street by the Transfer Station.



Recipe of the month

Brussels Sprouts with Balsamic and Cranberries

3 pounds Brussels Sprouts

1/2 cup olive oil

1 cup sugar

3/4 cup balsamic vinegar

1 cup dried cranberries

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees

Trim/clean the brussels sprouts, then cut them in half. Arrange on two baking sheets and toss with olive oil. Roast until brown, 25 to 30 minutes.

Combine the balsamic vinegar and sugar in a saucepan. Bring to a boil, then reduce the heat to medium-low and reduce until very thick.

Place sprints in a serving dish, drizzle the balsamic reduction over the roasted sprouts, then sprinkle on the dried cranberries.

Serves 10 to 12

Transfer Station 2018 Schedule Tuesdays 1pm -5pm Saturdays 9am-5pm

- During a winter snow event, the Transfer Station may be closed until plowed out.
- Punch cards are sold by check only at the Transfer Station only during open hours, NO CASH!
 15 punches on a \$75 punch card 50 gallon bags
 20 punches on a \$75 punch card 42 gallon bags
 28 punches on a \$75 punch card 30 gallon bags
 60 punches on a \$75 punch card 13 gallon bags
- There is no charge for recycling for local residents and town businesses
- The town requires the separation of trash and recyclables.
- The following items are accepted at the Transfer Station:
 Appliances, Books, Bulky Rigid Plastics, CDs/DVDs, Clothing/Textiles, Electronics, Loose Metal, Tires
- Banned Items include:
 Composts, Construction Materials, Hazardous Products, Recyclables, Yard Waste
- Granville residents can bring acceptable Household Hazardous Products to NEDT, 190 East Main St. in Westfield. The town will pay the first \$30.00 of products at the drop-off collection center. See town website for list of acceptable items and fees.
