WINTER ROADS

The winter of 2023-24 is upon us and all Granville residents should take note the following winter weather road maintenance concerns:

On-street parking is prohibited. Vehicles are subject to removal at the owner's expense.

- Parking at the Town Hall, Library, Village School, Center Fire Station, and West Fire Station is restricted to those doing Town business during business hours.
- Plowing, blowing, or otherwise depositing snow on Town roads is prohibited.
- Trucks conducting snow and ice control travel at slow speeds and may maneuver unpredictably. For the safety of all please use caution and courtesy in the presence of maintenance vehicles and pass only when safe.
- Despite continual ice and snow control during winter precipitation, all roads are periodically subject to hazardous conditions. Please avoid all non-essential travel.
- Beware of shaded areas prone to early freeze-up or black ice that can become hazardous even on blue sky days. Notorious for this are the "gorge", "hairpin turn", the north end of Old Westfield Road, and Water Street between the Transfer Station and Trumble Lane.
- Winter sand is available at the Highway Garage to residents of Granville. Sand is not available during winter weather operations when large trucks and heavy equipment are maneuvering in the limited yard space. During this time entering the Highway Department Facility is prohibited.

Highway crews appreciate your cooperation and patience when winter weather strikes. For more information, contact the Superintendent of Public Works at 357-8585 extension 6.

Per State Law MGL Chapter 51, section 4, your annual street listing will be sent out this month. Please respond within 10 days of receiving your form. If you have your mail sent to a post office box and/or did not receive a form, call or stop in for a form to complete. <u>This street listing updates your information for all the coming elections this year.</u>

<u>Annual Dog Licenses</u>

The street listing/census package also includes a dog license application for dog owners on record. All dogs that are six months of age or older must be licensed annually under M.G.L. Ch. 140. An updated proof of rabies vaccination as well as proof of spaying and neutering is required for a dog license.


Veteran's Representative – office hours second Thursday of the month from 9-11am. Stop by if you have questions/concerns.




JUNIOR DUCK STAMP CONTEST Hosted by the Mass Wildlife Division of Fisheries & Wildlife





Representative Boldyga Joins Republican Caucus in Urging Democratic Leadership to Release State Employee Pay Raises

BOSTON, MA – State Representative Nick Boldyga (R-Southwick) recently joined his colleagues in the Massachusetts House Republican Caucus to demand action from Democratic leadership regarding the release of pay raises for over 100,000 state employees. In a joint letter addressed to the Democratic leadership, the Caucus urged immediate action to report on part of a larger omnibus spending bill currently in conference committee that would ensure full funding for collective bargaining agreements approved earlier this year.

At the center of the call for action is the delay in providing funding for the agreed-upon pay raises for a vast number of state workers. Representative Boldyga voiced concerns over the delay caused by disagreement among Democratic leadership, citing that withholding these pay raises demonstrates an ongoing dysfunction and lack of transparency within the Democratic controlled legislature.

"Delaying the funding for essential pay raises that have been agreed upon for over 100,000 state employees is unacceptable," said Representative Boldyga. "Holding these pay raises hostage because they were bundled into a larger spending bill is a stark reflection of the dysfunction in Boston under one-party rule. Our hardworking state employees deserve fair compensation, and it's irresponsible to politicize their livelihoods in this manner."

The joint letter emphasizes the urgency of the matter stating "that the lack of agreement on other unrelated areas of the close out budget does not justify continuing to hold up indefinitely the funding of these CBAs…". The letter further highlights the need to separate the funding for employee pay raises from the broader legislative package to ensure timely and deserved compensation for state workers.

"There's simply no excuse," said Representative Boldyga. "The cost of living in Massachusetts continues to rise, making it more and more difficult for many hardworking state employees to make ends meet. We owe it to them to approve funding for their pay raises before the Thanksgiving holiday."

Representative Boldyga says he will remain committed to advocating for fair compensation of all state employees, urging swift action from Democratic leadership to ensure that these pay raises are not further delayed or are continued to be used as political leverage.

Granville's 'Great Heart' & Garden Quilt messages 'Hope' & 'Peace' @ 225+ years old

As this January 25th marks the 70th Anniversary of Albion Wilson's *History of Granville, MA* (1954) and the 270th Anniversary of Granville's incorporation (1754) when Bedford settlement was named after the Earl of Granville, John Carteret (1690-1763), the "most brilliant scholar in England," (Wilson, p. 51), a circa 1797-1798 Granville quilt, offers clues for interpreting the educational message of stained glass windows at the Granville Public Library (1902). The quilt dyed green, the color symbolic of 'Hope,' features grape clusters, a large rose, and leafy vines springing from a 'Great Heart' with olive-like orbs reflecting its maker's first name, Olive Curtiss Baker (c. 1776-1844) of West Granville, suggesting the windows' circular motifs in hues of

green represent fruit of the 'Olive Branch' of 'Peace' that fosters education and libraries.

At the foot of Olive's quilt (color altered; digitally enhanced by me to show detail here, Courtesy Pocumtuck Valley Memorial Association's Memorial Hall Museum, Deerfield, MA), the Great Heart was stitched upon a pyramid of half-suns stacked like cannon balls. Along all four quilt borders, Olive's



pyramids resembled that standing for "Strength and Duration" overseen by the 'Eye of Providence' in a



triangle emanating light in 1786 on the reverse of her new nation's Great Seal (left), adorned with an olive branch by the date '1776,' the year of Olive Curtiss's birth. The quilt's border suggests divine light would shine upon the newlywed minister's wife's 'garden' of nation, church, and family. So, after decades of use and public exhibition before its centennial (1898), as UV 'light' was fading Olive's enlightening symbolism, admirers—including her granddaughter and also Granville's Library Club organized in 1896 by Ria Cooley to build a new library—carried forward Olive's timeless message of 'Hope' & 'Peace' for a new century via stained glass Library windows activated by light.

On August 30, 1797, Olive, the daughter of Lt. David Curtiss, veteran of the American Revolution, married Rev. Joel Baker. The longest serving (36 years) minister of the West Granville Congregational Church, he was responsible for the first Academy (built near the church in 1837, after his death), and for forming "the first library" in Granville (Wilson, pp. 253, 268). So, Olive's Great Heart of 'Peace,' evolved in one library window as a leafy globe containing an emblematic anchor (symbol of 'Hope') entwined by a dolphin known for speed and intelligence, to encourage readers to pause and think on what they've read, illustrating the 1494 motto, "Make haste slowly," of Venetian printer 'Aldus' Manutius. The first to publish portable books (not chained to medieval shelves), Aldus' name (on window above) and emblem reflect a free library's importance.

Olive's design was inspired by the later published sermon delivered at Rev. Baker's ordination (June 1797) by visiting Rev. John Emerson, who recommended Rev. Baker, trusting "he has the grace of God in his heart;" praying he'd "be led to feed his sheep;" and comparing the church to a vineyard, a garden (*Sermon*, p. 17), and bride's "raiment of needlework" (Psalm 45:14). His allegories evolved as Olive's whole-cloth bridal quilt made completely of wool from sheep in Granville meadows. Fittingly, soon after this past September 1st, when the Church marked the 190th Anniversary of Rev. Baker's death, a copy of that sermon came to light at the Historical Room. Available for reading there, or online at *Granville History*, excerpts appear in my 2020 book (cover, next page) that first documented Olive's design as based on the sermon, to specify her quilt was made in West Granville, MA not (as frequently described) Durham, CT from whence Olive's paternal grandparents followed Deacon David Rose to first settle Bedford (Granville).

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Granville's 'Great Heart' & Garden Quilt, Continued . . .

Olive's granddaughter, Laura Baker Wells (1835-1913), appeared in the Ladies Home Journal (July 1906), as central of three "Daughters of America," (photo, Courtesy Pocumtuck Valley Memorial Association's Memorial Hall Museum, Deerfield, MA). Growing up under the gambrel roof of the Daniel



Rose, Lt. Jacob Baldwin, Rev. Baker . . . William B. Phelon House (right) within sight of the Church, both captioned as "Landmarks" in Hampden County publications (1891-1897), Laura was the daughter of Olive's son Francis, who supported his father's Academy plan. An avid reader, she became a schoolteacher, and in 1860, married Edward Wells of Deerfield. There, she gifted her grandmother's heirloom quilt to the first historical society in



western Massachusetts, the Pocumtuck Valley Memorial Association, by 1886, when the PVMA, of which Laura was a member, exhibited it in their Memorial Hall Museum. Built as Deerfield Academy in 1798, the year Olive completed her quilt, Hall and quilt reached their Quasquibicentennials (225th Anniversaries) in 2023. The Granville quilt was the first in the U.S. to be exhibited in a period room in an American museum where its venue inspired two treasured creations of the Deerfield Arts and Crafts Movement, a nationally publicized bed set (1897-1898) for Phoebe Apperson Hearst; and, here stated for the first time, the *Garden of Hearts* bridal chest (1903) by Madeline Yale Wynne, a leader of America's Arts and Crafts Movement. Just acquired by Historic Deerfield, the chest was considered by Wynne, to be her finest artistic accomplishment.

Laura's eye for choosing colors (perhaps for stained glass windows, too?) for nationally exhibited Deerfield rugs is apparent in her photo (above) titled "Planning the Rug," taken in 1902, the year Granville's Library was dedicated. She was elected Vice President of the Deerfield Rug Makers in 1904 (Suzanne L. Flynt, *Poetry to the Earth*, 2012, p. 166). No doubt, Laura's work was known to Julia



Selinda Ives, talented Tolland quilt-maker (photo, right), and her relation Nelsie Sheets, (c. 1910 photo, left, by Granville's George Aldrich), who wove rugs (lined up here) in Olive's brother Charles' former Granville home, on a barn loom Olive may have used.



When needleworker Marjorie Howe, researched the Baker quilt for her book, *Deerfield Embroidery* (1976), Helena W. Duris, Curator of the Mabel Root Henry Historical Museum, informed her the donor, 'Mrs. Wells,' was Laura Baker to whom Granville's Library Club wrote in 1896 (Geske, p. 111), seeking support for their campaign. Now, it appears Laura may have influenced the change in the architect's original Library plans from diamond pane to stained glass, and been inspirational to America's Arts and Crafts Movement, bringing it to her hometown, Granville, for library windows messaging 'Hope' and 'Peace' for all seasons. The window designer is yet to be named. Anyone knowing that, please contact the Historical Room in the New Year!

In retirement Hank and Rose spent traveling to England, Scotland, Austria, Germany, France, Italy, Spain and Holland as well as Bermuda and the Bahamas. They also enjoyed a 5 week, 3000 mile cross-country trip visiting many national parks, scenic vistas and many friends.

Rose served as volunteer Librarian at the Granville Library for many years and was docent and researcher in the Historical Room for 18 years. A life member of the Granville Library Club, serving as President, Vice President and Secretary.

She is predeceased by her husband Hank and her son Stephen. She leaves one son, Byard Miller a long time resident of Granville. She also leaves 4 grandchildren, 2 brothers and a sister.
