





### Stay Cool This Summer

As the heat rises this summer, be sure to keep cool to lower the risk of heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Elders are more vulnerable to these conditions due to body's reduced ability to handle extreme heat. Many seniors do not drink enough water and are more likely to become dehydrated. Even mild dehydration can cause problems with confusion, weakness, muscle cramps, headache, fatigue, decreased blood pressure and dizziness, and are at a higher risk of falling. With warm weather being sure to eat and drink enough fluids is more critical.

Take steps to prevent heat related illness:

Drink plenty of low sugar beverages (water, seltzer, iced tea)

Drink even when you are not thirsty, keep a water bottle next to the bed or favorite chair

choose food with higher water content fruits - watermelon, oranges, strawberries, cantaloupe, grapefruit, blueberries, pineapple and clementine's.

Vegetables – iceberg lettuce, tomatoes, cucumber, bell peppers, eggplant, baby carrots, cauliflower and celery

avoid alcohol and high sugar drinks

wear light loose fitting clothing

use an air conditioner or a fan during the day, visit your local senior center or library

keep blinds/ curtains closed during the day to keep your home cooler

limit sun exposure and always use sun screen

avoid hot foods, turning your oven on and heavy meals that warm your body

use a "buddy system" to check in with friends and neighbors who may be at risk

### Warning signs for heat exhaustion

Heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, headache, nausea or vomiting, fainting

### Warning signs of Heat Stroke

Nausea, throbbing headache, dizziness, rapid, strong pulse, extreme high body temperature (above 103), red hot and dry skin (with no sweating)

If you or someone you know develop any of these symptoms, **call for help immediately!**

1 1/3 to 1 2/3 cups sugar


1/3 cup all purpose flour


