Business Certificates

In conformity with the provision of Chapter 110 § 5 of the Massachusetts General Laws anyone conducting business under an alias (i.e., any name other than their own), including corporations, to file a Business Certificate in the community where their business is principally headquartered.

- The Certificate is effective for four years and the filing fee is \$30.00.
- All forms must be signed in the Town Clerk's Office.

Attached is a copy of Granville's Business Certificate to be used for your convenience. Please call ahead and make an appointment.

Marriage Intentions

If you wish to marry, you may contact my office or any other Town Clerk in the Commonwealth. The first document that a couple must complete is the Marriage Intentions Form and both must be present at the same time to do so. Following this, a license is issued and you can be married any place in the Commonwealth. Your marriage license is filed at the Town Clerk's Office where the Marriage Intentions Form is completed. Vital Records

Birth records are filed based on residence. If you are a resident of Granville at the time of the birth of your child, then the child's birth certificate will be filed in Granville. Death records are filed in the community in which you pass away. Certified copies of vital records (Birth, Marriage, Death) are \$10.00.

Notary Public

The Town Clerk, as well as the Town Administrator/ Matt Streeter are Notaries Public. If you need our services, please call either of us and make an appointment. The service is free of charge to Granville residents. Please note Notary Services are provided as a courtesy.

A Notary does NOT give legal advice.

The following are REQUIRED in order to be provided with Notary Services:

- The document CANNOT already have been signed
- All signers MUST be PRESENT at time of notarizing
- The Notary is stating they have WITNESSED the document being signed
- The person(s) signing MUST provide a proper photo ID

The document MUST contain the appropriate Notarial Statement (Clause) - NO EXCEPTIONS ... Types of Notary: Jurat (statements are true) OR Acknowledgement (ones free act). The certificate MUST contain the oath given by notary to identify the type of notary act.



The Granville Fire Department wants you to stay safe this Summer season!

July brings Independence Day celebrations, Campfires, and lots of Yard Work!

Below are a few tips and reminders to help keep you and your family safe.

Fireworks:

The State Fire Marshal asks the citizens of Massachusetts to set a good example for children and leave the fireworks to the professionals. Enjoy the many displays of fireworks supervised by local fire departments and conducted by licensed professionals.

Children imitate what they see adults do and if you use fireworks, they won't realize how dangerous they are. Not only do sparklers burn at more than 1200 degrees Fahrenheit but they also encourage the use of matches and lighters by young children.

The possession and use of all fireworks by private citizens is illegal in Massachusetts. This includes Class C fireworks which are sometimes falsely called "safe and sane fireworks". Class C fireworks include sparklers, party poppers, snappers, firecrackers, spinners, cherry bombs and more. It is illegal to transport fireworks into Massachusetts, even if they were purchased legally elsewhere. Illegal fireworks can be confiscated on the spot.

Gasoline/Yard Work:

Over the past five years, Massachusetts hospitals treated 135 people for gasoline-related burns. Gasoline vapors ignite at a very low temperature. These fumes are heavier than air, and can travel a distance to find a spark.

At home, always store gas containers in a safe secure area, outside of living areas, (such as a locked shed or detached garage) and away from ignition sources such as pilot lights.

A spark or a lit cigarette is enough to light the invisible fumes that may linger on clothing. Wait for mowers and other gas powered machines to cool before refilling with gas.

If a fire starts while handling gasoline, don't attempt to extinguish the fire. Leave the area immediately and call 9-1-1.

Fire Pits/Campfires:

Fire pits have become increasingly popular in recent years. Unless they are being used primarily for cooking, however, they are technically subject to the MassDEP open burning regulation. If you do use a fire pit for cooking, the fire must be:

Kept to a reasonable size (3'x3'x3'), Located away from combustible materials, Contained in a non-flammable enclosure, and Tended by someone who is 18 years of age or older. Keep a water source and fire tools close by.

Remember to burn only clean, dry firewood. This will minimize the amount of smoke leaving your property and lessen the chance of causing a nuisance for your neighbors. GFD must respond to nuisance smoke complaints. Burning trash, refuse and other similar materials is not allowed.



Harvest Fair meeting May 24, 2018

Although we were disappointed with the lack of response we received, we decided to keep the fair open 3 days this year. We will revisit the issue after this year's fair.

How we came to this decision was not easy, we had only 8 new people volunteer, which puts us in the same situation we have been in for many years.
