Brooklynn Hayes loves swimming.

At the Pioneer Valley Swim League Championship Meet at Longmeadow High School Jan. 28-29, she broke a record that stood for 32 years. She swam a time of 33.45 seconds to win the 50-yard breaststroke in the 11-12 age groups. This high honors student topped the mark of 34 seconds flat, set by Elizabeth Bohn in 1980.

Brooklynn is in the seventh grade at Granville Village School.

"I was thinking about it a lot (this swim season). It was my main focus. It's been pretty-much the whole season, but I started focusing on it the last few weeks. I was happy I broke it but I was disappointed it wasn't my fastest time."

It was the first PVSL record for her, a member of the Falcons Swim Club. Interestingly, she set the new mark in her final attempt at the record. When she moves up to the 13-14 age groups, the 50 breaststroke won't exist, as the distance is pushed up to 100 yards.

Coach Tim Allen said she has a remarkable work ethic and is willing to listen to the advice of her coaches. One thing that sets her apart from other good swimmers is her willingness to try new technique changes and adjustments.

Brooklynn also swims for Mei's Typhoons Swim Club, a USA swimming club. She swims six days a week, and sometimes seven. She said she's been able to handle the rigorous schedule because she looks forward to going to practice. "I like how when I go to practice my friends are there and we have fun with the practice and we train hard, and my coaches are really nice and do fun things," Brooklynn said. She has the third-best time in the 50 breaststroke this season in the 11-12 age groups on the New England Swimming circuit.

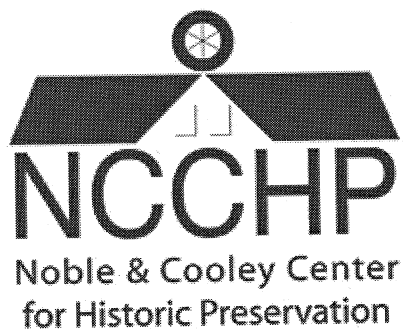

SENIOR HOUSING

The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination against households with children. That prohibition is one the law's of seven protected classes or categories. An important exemption to this is senior housing. Housing communities intended for seniors can legally limit access to households with children.

Communities are considered senior housing under the familial status exemption if the units are either 100% occupied by persons over 62 years of age or 80% of the occupied units are inhabited by at least one person 55 or older. Attendants, health care providers or family care providers aren't considered as part of that 80% rule.

Because the exemption allows up to 20% of the units to be occupied by families with children, provided state or local antidiscrimination laws are not violated, these families can be lawfully restricted from certain benefits of the community or otherwise treated differently than the senior households. An example would be allowing use of the pool only during certain hours.

Before deciding on a senior housing community, due your due diligence to make sure the community truly is a senior housing community.

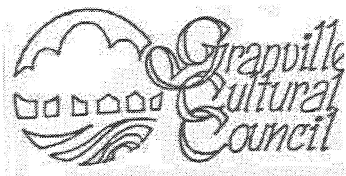

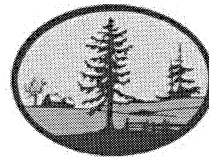
