The Granville Fire Department wants you to know about Electrical Safety!

Arc Fault Circuit Interrupter (AFCI)

An arc fault circuit interrupter is a new device designed to actually reduce the likelihood of fires. It responds to arcing and sparking within a circuit before the circuit breaker or fuse trips. The AFCI breaker trips to help prevent the fire from occurring in the first place. The AFCI is installed at the electrical panel and doesn't look much different than a regular circuit breaker. AFCIs are mostly found in newly built homes, but can easily be installed in older homes equipped with circuit breakers.

Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI)

Installing Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) receptacles can reduce deaths from electrical shock in and around the home by two-thirds. GFCIs should be installed by a qualified electrician in places near water such as kitchen counters, bathrooms and other areas subject to moisture, including the outdoors.

Preventing Electrocutions and Shocks Safety Tips:

- Install plastic safety covers in unused electrical outlets to protect children from shock hazard.
- When unplugging a cord or appliance from an outlet, pull the plug not the cord. Pulling by the cord can cause damage to the wiring at the connection.
- Do not defeat polarized plugs (one prong larger than the other) or the third or ground prong.
- Keep electrical appliances and cords away from water.
 Keep yourself alive by keeping water and electricity separate.

Electricity is a powerful energy source that must be treated with care and respect.

When we think about electricity, we think about electric current. Electric current is the power running along wires in our home and generates heat as it travels. The electrical current is like water running through a hose. The size of the cord can carry only so much electricity before it starts to overheat. The more electricity you draw along a cord, the more quickly it heats up. For

instance, an appliance like a space heater can draw a lot of current and needs to be plugged in with a properly designed cord.

Potential Warning Signs and Hazards

Call the fire department immediately if you have any of these warning signs:

- Arcs, sparks or short circuits;
- Sizzling or buzzing sound;
- Odors, vague smell of something burning

Firefighters can use thermal imaging technology to see excessive heat inside the walls.


Call a professional electrician soon if you have any of these warning signs:

- Frequently blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers;
- Dim or flickering lights, bulbs that wear out too fast;
- Overheated plugs, cords or switches;
- Shock or mild tingle more than normal static electricity;
- Loose plugs; or
- Unusually warm or faulty outlets or switches.

Look around for these hazards in your home and correct them:

- Overloaded outlets more than one appliance cord plugged into one wall outlet.
- Cords pinched behind furniture like couches or bureaus.
- Overloaded power strips. They should only be used with a few low current devices such as electronics.
- Lamps or fixtures with light bulbs higher than the recommended wattage. Most lamps recommend 60 watts. Be careful where you use higher wattage bulbs.
- Electrical cords underneath rugs, carpet or furniture.
 Move them to reduce the risk of fire from overheating due to worn insulation.
- Cords with frayed wires or cracked insulation. Replace them with new ones having a certification label from an independent testing laboratory.
- An extension cord that is not properly rated for the appliance it powers. Typical "lamp cord" extension cords cannot carry the electrical current needed for appliances such as space heaters or air conditioners.
- Cords or wires that are nailed into place. This can cause electrical shorts and arcing.
- Indoor appliances and cords being used outdoors.

NEW MEDICARE CARDS WILL BE MAILED BETWEEN APRIL 2018 AND APRIL 2019.

You asked and Medicare listened. Your Social Security number will be removed from your Medicare card to protect your identity.

You'll get a new Medicare card with a number that's unique to you and this number can only be used for your Medicare coverage.

THERE WILL BE NO CHANGES TO YOUR BENEFITS.

Beware of anyone who contacts you about your new Medicare card. Medicare and the Social Security Administration will not call you for your personal information. Do not give any personal information to anyone you DO NOT know.

The only thing you need to do to get your new Medicare card is to make sure your mailing address is up to date. If your address needs to be corrected, contact Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 or visit SSA.Gov/MyAccount. TTY users can call 1-800-325-0778.

Mailing everyone a new card will take time. Your card might arrive at a different time than your friend's, neighbor's or even your spouse.

Dog Licenses

We just held the Annual Rabies Clinic and Dog Licensing on Saturday, April 14, 2018. We had 18 dog/cats receive vaccinations and 12 dogs were licensed. If you have a dog(s) and I missed sending you a form, call or stop in. All dogs that are six months of age or older must be licensed annually under M.G.L. Ch. 140. An updated proof of rabies vaccination is required prior to licensing as well as proof of spaying and neutering. Incomplete applications will be returned to the sender. Fee for a spayed or neutered dog is \$10. Fee for an unaltered dog is \$15. It is the owner's responsibility to register their pets by April 16th. A late fee of \$20 will be charged after that date.

Marriage Intentions

If you wish to marry, you can contact my office or any other Town Clerk in the Commonwealth. The first document that the couple must complete is the Marriage Intentions Form and both must be present at the same time to do so. Following this, a license is issued and you can be married any place in the Commonwealth. Your marriage license is filed at the Town Clerk's Office where the Marriage Intentions Form is completed. Business Certificate:

What is a Business Certificate?

Commonly known as a "DBA" ("doing business as"), a Business Certificate creates a public record of the name and address of the owner(s) of a business. This also includes anyone operating any type of home-based business. Consumers are entitled to this information and it may not otherwise be readily available.

Who must file a Business Certificate?

Massachusetts General Law Chapter 110, § 5 states that any person conducting business in the Commonwealth under any title other than the real name of the person conducting the business, whether individually or as a partnership, shall file a Business Certificate in the office of the Town Clerk of every city or town where an office of any such person or partnership may be situated.

Under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 110, §6 a Business Certificate is not required if a corporation is doing business under any title which includes the true surname of any partner. Certain other associations and partnerships may also be exempt (refer to above citation for details.)

How do I file or renew a Business Certificate?

Forms are available by mail, on the town website, or in person. Each person named on the Business

Certificate must either sign the form in person at the Town Clerk's Office or have their signature notarized on the form by a Notary Public. Filing a DBA does not protect your business name. The filing fee is \$30.00 and good for four years. Proper identification will be required.

Does the filing of a Business Certificate protect me from others using the same name?

No. The protection of a trademark (word, name, symbol or device) in Massachusetts is accomplished through the Secretary of State's Office.

Information about starting a business in Massachusetts can also be found on the States website www.mass.gov

What if I discontinue or withdraw from the business or move to another location?

A Statement of Discontinuance, Change of Residence form must be completed and filed with the Town Clerk if one of the following occurs before the expiration (discontinuance or information change filing fee is \$10.00):

- Business is discontinued,
- One or more persons named on the certificate is withdrawn or retired from the

business or partnership,

- Change of residence of one of the named persons on the certificate, or
- One or more of the persons named on the certificate dies.

Vital Records

Birth records are filed based on residence. If you are a resident of Granville at the time of the birth of your child, then the child's birth certificate will be filed in Granville. Death records are filed in the community in which you died. Certified copies of vital records (Birth, Marriage, Death) are \$10.00.

Notary Public

The Town Clerk, as well as the Town Administrator/Matt Streeter are Notaries Public. If you need our services, please call either of us and make an appointment. The service is free of charge to Granville residents.

CARBON PRICING IN MA – A KEY COMPONENT FOR SOLVING A WARMING CLIMATE

On Tuesday, May 8th, 6:00 PM in Parenzo Hall's Dever Auditorium at Westfield State University [WSU], the Dept. of Chemical and Physical Sciences and the Dept. of Environmental Science will co-host a public educational forum on "<u>Carbon Pricing – A Key To Solving A Warming Climate</u>."

The forum will: provide a brief overview of the current science on climate change; describe bills by State Rep. Benson & State Sen. Barrett proposing state-wide carbon fee and rebate legislation, and an omnibus bill by State Sen. Pacheco that would also institute carbon pricing; and lay out the ethical and moral dimensions for addressing a warming climate. Attendees will learn how each of these MA carbon pricing bills is economically designed to create jobs, improve the health of MA residents and fairly protect vulnerable populations and businesses while lowering state-wide carbon emissions.

The forum's panel will include: Carsten Braun, Ph.D., climate scientist, Geography & Regional Planning Dept., Westfield State University; State Rep. Jennifer Benson, lead co-sponsor of H.1726, a bill placing a price on carbon in MA; Marc Breslow, Ph.D., Dir. of Policy & Research at ClimateXChange; and Rev. Dr. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas, Missioner for Creation Care in the Episcopal Diocese of Western Mass. and Mass. Conference, United Church of Christ. The forum will be moderated by Hillary Sackett, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Economics at WSU.

The forum is organized by Voices Rising Together, a grass-roots advocacy group, and cosponsored by CAN [Climate Action Now], ClimateXChange, Clean Energy Future Massachusetts, and The Social Justice Commission [Episcopal Diocese of Western Mass.].


