

Greetings Granville Residents,

My name is Phil Burns and I have recently been hired as the Outreach Coordinator by the Southern Hilltown Council on Aging Consortium and the Hilltown Community Health Centers (Yes, that's quite a mouthful). Basically, what this means is that I will be working closely with the different COA's in the towns of Russell, Huntington, Blandford, Middlefield, Granville and Tolland. I will also be working with the Health Centers through the Social Services office at 9 Russell Road, Huntington. I am currently being trained as a SHINE counselor and in the fall I will complete a Community Health Worker certification course at UMass-Amherst. In the next several weeks and months I am hoping to meet residents from your community and get to know people better, particularly seniors. I think it's important to know each other's stories. It helps people understand where others are coming from, and in the case of my job I think it will help me develop a deeper bond with the community. I'm also hoping we can talk about ways to get more intergenerational activities going in the Hilltowns. I hope some of you will reach out and take the time to sit and talk with me.

I am really excited to be working with COA's to expand outreach in the region. This is especially exciting for me because I am new to the Hilltowns. I've done quite a bit of travelling over the last 10 years, but I grew up mostly in Maryland outside Washington, DC. While I had visited Western Massachusetts and other parts of New England many times before being hired. I'm looking forward to meeting new friends and enjoying Hilltown life. I love being outdoors, especially hiking and kayaking and there are few places better than the Hilltowns to hike and get out on the water.

I'm also a big sports fan and I must say coming from the Washington, DC area I am a little jealous of the New England professional sports teams' run of success over the past 10 years or so (I moved to the Washington, DC area a couple years after their last Super Bowl, so it's been 20 plus years of getting excited when our teams merely make the playoffs and inevitably lose). So, I hope we can get together and talk about anything from the Patriots and Sox to good hikes in the area to negotiating the health care system and everything in between.
