Remembering......

the quiet, gentle, dignified lady we all knew as Helena. What a treasure Granville had all the many years her presence graced this pleasant village.

Helena Womboldt was born in Newton, MA into a family of many children, in the year 1904. She was graduated from Framingham State Teachers College at the age of 19. At that time she accepted a job offer at the West Granville Ore Hill School, teaching grades one thru nine. She arrived here "on the stage". That takes ones imagination back in time, doesn't it? She found room with board in the Charles Reeves home on Main Road. She carried her lunch each day as did all her pupils and she walked the long hill distance, in cold, sometimes snowy weather to the school house. I am sure without complaint. She was truly loved by all her students, many remembering her long after their school years finished.

Helena met Joseph Durís here. His family lived in an early colonial house on Beech Hill Road. They were married in 1930 in a beautiful wedding ceremony in the Newton home of her folks. Helena and Joe, at this time, purchased the house in West Granville known as the Harger house, former home of a Granville cobbler. She made this house into a warm and gracious home. She lived there until her death in 1992 at the age of 88.

Helena is still remembered for her warmth, her gentle smile and the vast knowledge she accumulated in regard to Granville's history and the wondrous genealogical treasures that make up this history. You could ask her any question about the town's founding fathers, be it Coe Robinson, Baldwin, Barlow or Spellman plus dozens of others and on the tip of her tongue was all you needed to know about any family who settled here before 1800.

We, all who knew her, consider ourselves fortunate to have been witness to an era that was graced by this lovely lady and we are all richer for it.

Granville CULTURAL COUNCIL SEEKS FUNDING PROPOSALS

Proposals for community-oriented arts, humanities, and science programs due October 15

The Granville Cultural Council has set an October 15th postmark deadline for organizations, schools and individuals to apply for grants that support cultural activities in the community.

According to Council spokesperson, these grants can support a variety of artistic projects and activities in Granville including exhibits, festivals, field trips, short-term artist residencies or performances in schools, workshops and lectures.

The Granville Cultural Council is part of a network of 329 Local Cultural Councils serving all 351 cities and towns in the Commonwealth. The LCC Program is the largest grassroots cultural funding network in the nation, supporting thousands of community-based projects in the arts, sciences and humanities every year. The state legislature provides an annual appropriation to the Massachusetts Cultural Council, a state agency, which then allocates funds to each community.

This year, the Granville Cultural Council will distribute about \$4300.00 in grants. Previously funded projects include: Watercolor Summer Workshop, Summer Reading Program, Christmas with Nova Cantori and NCCHP Living History.



October 11 - 13 is the 33rd annual Granville Harvest Fair weekend. The NCCHP museum is on the bus route and will be open all three days of the fair. Come watch scheduled demonstrations of wood veneering, steam-bending, wood burning, blacksmithing, pottery throwing, small engine displays and more. Visit the museum Gift Shop for toy drums, ice buckets and handcrafted items made by local artisans. Enjoy browsing and finding unique gifts at the indoor and outdoor vendor booths: AJ's Wooden Crafts featuring hand painted tables, shelves, bats and doll cradles; hand crafted jewelry by Joyce Banks; books by TJ Banks, a local author; Arnie Paye's wooden scroll saw clocks, plagues and ornaments; leg warmers and chaps by Tony & Susan Phillips; soy candles, beer nuts and more! Plenty of great food and drink options will be available on-site: The Crepes Teahouse will be making both sweet and savory crepes; The Westfield River Brewery will be back again this year with a selection of crafted beers; and new this year a food vendor serving kielbasa, brats and stuffed pretzels. Hourly tours of the museum will be available for \$5.00 donations which includes a raffle ticket for the annual "Granville bucket"...a Noble & Cooley ice bucket filled with Granville maple syrup, Granville cheese, crackers, and a 2015 family membership to the NCCHP museum.

October 29th at 6:30PM the NCCHP museum will host the final Living History event of the 2014 season. In keeping with the Halloween spirit, please join us as Al and Betsy McKee from the Longmeadow Cemetery Organization present "Gravestone CSI: Determining some of the causes of death in the 18th and 19th centuries through gravestone inscriptions". The living history programs are free of charge and light refreshments are served. Donations are always appreciated.

The NCCHP museum at the Drum Shop is located at 42 Water Street in Granville and is open for tours on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month from 12:00 – 3:00. Be sure to take a tour and check out the newest rotating exhibit featuring the Danish colony that settled in Granville in the late 1800's. Come learn about Denmark and how, when, where and why so many Danes settled in Granville. Many old artifacts are on display including shipping trunks, wooden shoes, and household items as well as pictures and information about the early Danish families. There's a lot to see and explore about the daily lives and contributions of these families to Granville and the surrounding towns.

Tours for groups of ten or more are available weekdays by appointment (call 413-357-6321). Museum admission is free for NCCHP members; \$5 for adults and \$3 for children for non-members. The Gift Shop is open weekdays year round from 9:00 – 4:00 as well as whenever the museum is open for tours and features hand crafted items made by local artists, potters, woodcrafters, quilters, authors and more!

Dorothy, Dot ("Ma") Stacker and her husband Max lived in a house on the southwest side of the current village green. This is the land donated to the town by the Woodger family. 

FICO SCORE CALCULATIONS CHANGE

Fair Isaac, the company that sells the FICO credit scores to mortgage companies, auto lenders, banks and credit card companies, has announced changes in their formula which could increase your credit score if;

You have settled debts with a collection agency.

You have unpaid medical bills

Your credit is weak because you're just starting out or you're a retiree who doesn't use much credit.

When you're credit score is high, it could result in less interest paid when borrowing money for a home or car. If your score is too low, you may not be able to get a loan.

Anticipated changes:

If unpaid medical debt is the only unpaid debt on your credit report, your score could rise by about 25 points.

If your debt was sold to a collection agency and you paid it, your FICO score won't be lowered.

If you don't use much credit, Fair Isaac will use other information such as rent payments to increase the accuracy of your score.

The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau has stated medical debt isn't a strong indicator that other types of debt won't be paid.

Your mortgage rate may take longer to come down as most lenders follow Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac lending guidelines. Those guidelines advise lenders to use a very specific mortgage credit score rather than the latest version of the FICO score. Currently the average Fannie Mae borrower has a FICO score of 744, and the average Freddie Mac borrower has a score of 749.

OBITUARY

Trygve S. "Trig" Petersen

Trig, age 95, a lifelong resident of Granville, died late Monday evening, September 1, 2014 at the Holyoke Soldiers Home. He was born and educated in Granville, a son of the late Joseph and Berthea (Spetland) Petersen and was a graduate of Westfield Vocational High School. Trig was a veteran of WW II serving as an Infantry Unit Commander with the United States Army, participating in campaigns in Normandy, Northern France and Germany. He was the recipient of several citations including the Bronze Star Medal, EAME Campaign Ribbon with 3 Bronze Stars, Combat Infantryman's Badge. American theater Ribbon and the World War II Victory Medal. Upon his honorable discharge from active service he returned home and began a long career in the wood pattern making business spanning over 40 years. He worked for a short period of time with Hamilton Standard before opening his own business, Granville Pattern & Woodworking, Inc., from 1965-1983 in which he retired. His son continued to operate the business until 1999. Trig was a lifetime member of the Southwick American Legion Post # 338 and the Southwick VFW Post # 872. Some of his favorite pastimes included traveling with his wife in their motor home, restoring a 32 foot wooden Maine hull powerboat for over two years, and designing and building his late home as well as the home his youngest son Eric resides in today. Trig was the devoted husband of the late Barbara (Hall) Petersen who died in March of 1999 and leaves two loving sons, Karl A. Petersen and his wife Susan and K. Eric Petersen and his wife Nancy both of Granville; 5 grandchildren, Kristin, Karin, Melissa, Joseph and Kyle; 5 greatgrandchildren as well as several nieces and nephews.
