## Marriage Intention:

### INTENTION OF MARRIAGE RULES FOR APPLYING

YOU MUST APPEAR IN PERSON AND TOGETHER at the Town Clerk's Office. The marriage must take place in Massachusetts. We need the DATE of marriage, PLACE of marriage and OFFICIANT NAME and ADDRESS (this is the person performing your ceremony, i.e. priest, minister, rabbi, justice of the peace etc.) If the Officiant is from out of State such as a family member or friend, they must apply for a Special Commission from the Secretary of State Office. This Special Commission must be submitted to the Clerk's Office when you apply for the License.

Secretary of State, Commissions Divisions McCormack Building – 17th floor 1 Ashburton Place Boston, MA 02108 617.727.2836 WAITING PERIOD – There is a three (3) day waiting period which does not include the day you apply; it is three (3) full days, i.e. if you apply on a Monday you may receive the license on Thursday. You may obtain a three day waiver from a Judge at the district court and must be presented at the time of filing the Marriage Intention.

EXPIRATION DATE – The marriage must occur within 60 days of filing the Intention.

FEES – The office charges a fee of \$40.00 for the filing of a Marriage Intention and includes two certified photocopies of the Marriage Certificate. Additional certified photocopies of the Certificate of Marriage are \$10.00 each. Copies may be obtained in person or by mail.

BIRTH CERTIFICATES – If an applicant who wishes to apply for a marriage license is not 18 years of age, a court waiver order from a Judge at the district court must be presented at the time of filing the Marriage Intention. If the applicant's birth certificate is not in English it needs to be translated and the Translator's signature must be notarized. The translator needs to be an official translator not just a friend of the family.

DIVORCE – If a party to a marriage has been divorced in the last two (2) years, the office needs to see the Judgment of Divorce Nisi or Decree Nisi or Divorce Absolute with the State seal and date.


### Vital Records:

Birth records are filed based on residence. If you are a resident of Granville at the time of the birth of your child, then the child's birth certificate will be filed in Granville. Death records are filed in the community in which you pass away. Certified copies of vital records (Birth, Marriage, Death) are \$10.00.

## Notary Public:

The Town Clerk, as well as the Town Administrator/Matt Streeter are Notaries Public. If you need our services, please call either of us and make an appointment. The service is free of charge to Granville residents.



"Cornelia Hancock: Civil War Nurse" On Wednesday, September 16th at 7:00 PM at the NCCHP Museum at 42 Water St. in Granville, historian Carolyn Ivanoff, takes us back in time with excerpts from letters Cornelia Hancock wrote to her family. This is a remarkable story about a remarkable person. As well known as Clara Barton during the war years, this 23 year old never publicized her contributions, yet was revered by the men of the Army of the Potomac. She describes events of the Civil War from the perspective of the doctors and nurses who tended the wounded, sick and dying soldiers in makeshift hospitals. It is a fascinating, intriguing and heroic story of dedication in the darkest hours of the war.

Ivanoff, assistant principal at Shelton Intermediate School in Shelton, CT., is a versatile educator with over 25 years in the industry. She is a past recipient of the Civil War Preservation Trust's Teacher of the Year award and assisted in the development of the Civil War Trust's national Civil War curriculum.

## The Granville Fire Department has some reminders:

September – Trees, Shrubs and Flowers are in full growth – are they hiding anything?

Below are a few tips and reminders to help keep you and your family safe.

#### Seconds Count in an Emergency

- Protect your family and your property by having large visible house numbers.
- Firefighters, police officers, and paramedics find you faster when your home is properly marked.
- A visitor, child or injured person may be unable to give clear directions.
- Emergency personnel from a neighboring community may be unfamiliar with your area.

#### **Use Large Visible Numbers**

- Numbers need to be at least 4-inches in height and facing the street.
- Put the numbers under lighting, and use numbers with a contrasting background, so they will be visible at night.
- If your driveway is long, post your house number on both sides of a mailbox or sign pole at the end of the driveway near the road.
- Be sure to keep numbers visible by trimming trees, bushes and flowers.

#### Winter is Coming!

We know no one wants to think about the colder weather yet, but consider this - in a couple of short months, heating season will be upon us. Crisp October air is closer than you think! With the warm weather, most of our furnaces and stoves have been getting a well-deserved rest. Now is the best time to have your heating equipment cleaned and inspected, chimneys cleaned and inspected, before you start really needing them again. Take the time now to ensure a worry free and safe fall and winter! While you are at it – check and test those Carbon Monoxide detectors to make sure they are in good working order.

## Restoring the American Chestnut Tree to the Eastern Forest of the U.S.

Presented by John Meiklejohn. For centuries the American Chestnut was a majestic and useful giant of the eastern U.S. forest. It's bountiful annual harvest of nuts served man and wildlife alike, and the rot-resistant nature of its wood made it a valuable resource in many industries. However, in the early 20th century, an invasive Chestnut Blight from Asia decimated the American Chestnut population. For the past 35 years, The American Chestnut Foundation [TACF] has persevered with increasingly sophisticated research and progress towards restoring the American Chestnut. John will speak about the Foundation's ongoing restoration efforts up and down the East Coast, including the research orchards right here in Granville.
