Use Insect Repellent.

Use a repellent with DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide), or permethrin, according to the instructions on the product label. DEET is designed to be applied directly to your skin while permethrin is applied to your clothing. Products containing other active ingredients such as oil of lemon eucalyptus, picaradin or IR 3535 are also effective against mosquitoes and ticks.

Do a Tick Check Daily.

Finding and removing ticks promptly will help prevent them from spreading disease to you. Check yourself all over for ticks in a well-lit room. They like to hide in warm, dark areas like between the toes, in back of the knees, groin, armpits, and neck, along the hairline, and behind the ears. Some of them are as small as poppy seeds, so use a magnifying glass if you have to. Remove any attached ticks using a pair of fine-tipped tweezers. Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible and pull gently but firmly, straight outwards.




FELLOWSHIP HALL RENTALS

Restoring the Story

Emma L. Pawlowsky: Her 'Mother's Day' Story of Love Remembered through Blue Glass

Granville History recently posted this memorial window mystery photo, reading "In Memoriam Emma Pawlowsky," asking who was this special person? The Old English-style white letters are in a field of blue-glass that catches the morning light and admits a view of the Academy windows from inside the West Granville Congregational Church. In keeping with *Granville History's* theme "Restoring the Story," I launched a search for 'Emma' and found what could be her story based on available census records in the Northeast. Yet, this Emma L.'s connection to Granville has yet to be established beyond doubt, so to confirm she is the same 'Emma' memorialized in the window, *Country Caller* readers are encouraged to email the Historical Room at granvillehistory@cwmars.org with any info you may have.

Emma Louise Pawlowsky was born in 1863 in Massachusetts, during the Civil War. In the 1880 United States Federal Census for Springfield, MA, the only census Emma appears in, she was "keeping house" at

age 17, for her motherless family of five siblings. The youngest were Henry, age two and Robert, age five, attending school with brother Albert, age ten. Emma's father, Herman W. Pawlowsky (1827-1899) had emigrated from Saxony by 1860 when he was living in Worcester with his mother Augusta, and Ernest and Louis (probably younger brothers, ages 19 and 17). Herman spoke German and worked as a 'Wire Drawer,' reducing watch spring wire to improve it. In September of 1860, he married Catherine Kline (Germany, c. 1836-1879) at the Second Congregational Church in Worcester.

The memorial window suggests that at some point in their hard life, the Pawlowsky family found sanctuary in Granville. Perhaps, they were in Granville, c. 1870, when Herman found work as a "Designer of Woolens," boarding near a mill in Ellington, Tolland County, CT, before the family settled by 1875 in Springfield where, in 1880, he was working as a gardener. In 1880, Lena (1861-c. 1940s) age 19, was the eldest child, and worked in a 'Button Shop' (factory); 24 years later (1904), she would marry the foreman Arthur Dumbleton in Enfield, CT; they had no children. Of Lena and Emma's four brothers, Oscar (1867-1945), age 14, was the oldest and completed eighth grade. With an eye for detail, Oscar worked in "Toy [Manufacturing]," suggesting a connection (before 1880) to Noble & Cooley's musical toy making in Granville. In 1880, their next-door neighbor was a "Watch Dial Painter," in the field Herman had worked in, which provided a path to vocational education. *Continued...*

W y 1897, Oscar had married 'Ida,' and moved to Lancaster, PA, a center for American watchmaking, likely working for Hamilton Watch Company. About 1907, they moved and by 1920, he'd become a Dial Foreman, probably at Illinois Watch Company, also a maker of accurate approved railroad (pocket) watches used to safely run trains. By 1930, Oscar returned to Lancaster where, despite the Great Depression, he owned his home and opened a grocery store that he managed for years to come. In 1900, Emma's second oldest brother, Albert (c. 1871-1934) worked as a shipping clerk in Springfield, MA, living with his first wife Annie (d. before 1930) and daughter Blanche (b. 1899). He may have built his life work on an early interest in watch crystals (clear glass face), and by 1910, had become a 'Glazier' working for a building company in Bridgeport, CT. A glazier was a craftsman who cut glass, and removed and installed windows of all types from stained glass to plate glass.

This is where light may shine on the story of Emma's window. In 1920, Albert was working as a glazier at a 'plate glass factory,' and lived on Cedar Street, Boston, twelve minutes from the studio of Charles Jay Connick (1875-1945), whom *The New York Times* would call, "the world's greatest contemporary craftsman in stained glass." After working in Boston (1900-1902), and completing his first major commission (1910) in Brookline, MA, Connick opened his Boston studio in 1913. In 1930, Albert, still a glazier, at a 'glass company,' lived in Newton, MA as did Connick. Connick's stained glass windows can be found at the Second Church (Congregational) in Newton, and churches and libraries across the country. Other artists also designed for the Newton church, including Connick's protégé Joseph G. Reynolds (1886-1972) of Reynolds, Francis, and Rohnstock, responsible for the *Mothers' Window*. Dedicated to "all mothers—mothers who are gone, mothers who are with us still, and mothers who are yet to be," it was installed in 1926. That could be when Albert, with Oscar and Lena, arranged for the West Granville window for Emma, who stepped up to the role of 'mother.' Albert could have had a hand in the lettering and installing of the Granville window. It was influenced by Connick's palette, of 'Connick blue,' favoring white, the translation of 'Blanche' the name of Albert's daughter. In glasswork, deep blue means loyalty; white symbolizes eternal faith, peace, and purity.

Perhaps we now know who designed or made Emma's window (date unknown) at the West Granville Congregational Church, but not who made Granville Public Library's stained glass windows featuring the color of 'Hope' (green) after Olive Curtiss Baker's c. 1798 'Great Heart' quilt (*Country Caller*, Jan. 2024). Perhaps there's a connection if, when Albert's career in glass began, he helped to install the library windows, 1900-1902, at the very time Connick first worked in Boston. The story of the Pawlowsky family's strong ties to Granville is yet to be found. What's known, is that Emma Louise was "keeping house" as the 'mother' her family desperately needed when they lost their birth mother.

Thanks to the Springfield Museum and Springfield City Library Reference Librarians, we know city records say Emma died of pneumonia on January 8, 1890. She was probably a victim of the 'Russian flu.' One of the worst worldwide pandemics, it peaked in the United States the week of January 12, 1890. It looks like her brother Henry succumbed, and Robert would need long term care. Some scientists have suggested the 1889-1890 pandemic was caused by a coronavirus. The window suggests Emma may have saved lives before her own was lost, dying unmarried at 26 with her services held at Hope Church (Congregational) [*Springfield Daily Republican*, Jan. 9, p. 7]. Her story is a motherly profile in courage, and given our generation's pandemic, this seems the time to find her identity and appreciate her family's enduring love remembered and restored through blue-glass.


