

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS PRODUCTS COLLECTION

The **Town of Granville** has contracted with New England Disposal Technologies (NEDT) of Westfield for the collection and disposal of various Household Hazardous Products and chemicals from Granville residents.





Residents can bring automotive wastes (oil, coolants, fluids, grease), oil based paints (including solvents, thinners aerosol cans), or household cleaning products and Lawn/Garden/Pool supplies (fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides, chemicals) to the:

The Town will pay up the first \$30.00 of disposal costs and the residents will be responsible for any balance.

WINTER ROADS POLICY 2019-2020 In effect from November 1 - to April 30

- On-street parking is prohibited. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.
- Parking at the Town Hall, Library, or school is restricted to those doing Town business during business hours.
- During winter road operations, main roads are a priority.
- Town Roads with low use may be closed for the winter.
- Depositing snow on a Town road is prohibited.
- Plowing snow across a Town road is prohibited.
- "All season" tires are not a substitute for snow tires.
- High quality snow tires, preferably studded, are essential for winter driving.
- Limit travel during storm events.
- Drive below the posted speed.
- Be aware of changing road conditions, flurries, and frost. Shaded areas become hazardous rapidly. An isolated weather event will create hazardous conditions. Notorious for this are the Gorge and Hairpin Turn on Route 57, the North end of Old Westfield Road, and Water Street by the Transfer Station.

Winter Storm Policy

Property Damage During Winter Storms and Snow Removal Operations

WINTER STORM POLICY: Responsibility for Fixing/Replacing Roadside Mailboxes, Fences, and Landscaping.

This policy applies to all Granville residents.

Mailboxes, fences, and landscaping damaged by *snow* discharged from a snow plow will be the responsibility of the homeowner.

Mailboxes, fences, and landscaping damaged by contact with the *plow* will be repaired by the Highway Department.

The Highway Department will make repairs to mailboxes hit by the plow as soon as possible. Many mailboxes are closer to the pavement edge than recommended. Mailboxes that are in poor condition cannot with-stand heavy snow coming off a plow.

Mailboxes hit by contact with a plow will be repaired and the resident will receive an apology for the inconvenience.

Green Committee Pavilion

On Wednesday November 13th the Green Committee met to discuss building a pavilion on the pad at the Green. When the walkway was installed the pad was added so someday it could be the base for a pavilion. We are excited to start this project and asked to meet with the Select Board on Monday November 18th. Joe Pietroniero and Amos Carpenter presented what we had in mind. The Select Board were all in favor of the pavilion, they had several questions and some suggestions. The size would be 30X24, with a peaked roof all four sides will be open so as not to obstruct the view through the Green. There will be electricity and lighting for safety. The posts will start with stone pillars, then post and beam. As we formulate the plans, we will again meet with the Select Board and Bob Sullivan. This is a work in progress we will keep all informed through meetings and the Country Caller. We have always wanted a pavilion on the Green, but it took Joe to set things in motion!

A separate account has been set up to accept donations for this project. As of now we have donations of \$1065.00 from Joe & Carol Pietroniero, \$500.00 from Bill & Linda Blakesley and Dot & Joe donated \$200.00. This is a great start for this project, we anticipate the cost to be about \$6000.00. Anyone wishing to donate money send a check to the Town Hall indicating it's for the pavilion.

Amos Carpenter 413-209-2384, and Joe Pietroniero 413-530-6634 will oversee the Volunteer work force. Please call either one of them to donate your time toward this project. We know this will be a wonderful addition to our already beautiful Green and hope to have this built and ready for use before the July 4th. Celebration. GRANVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Granville Fire Department wants to keep you safe this holiday season!

Christmas Tree and Light Safety – It's that time of year again! Many of us will be decorating inside and outside of our homes. Here are some reminders to keep you safe!

- Keep trees away from heat sources.
- Water a cut tree daily and use a "non-tip" style tree stand.
- Never leave a lit tree unattended if you leave the house, turn off the lights.
- Dispose of your tree properly, soon after the holiday, before the needles dry out.
- Unplug all lighting before retiring for the evening or leaving the house.
- Purchase lights and electric decorations which are listed by an approved testing agency such as Underwriters Laboratory (UL).
- Check all lighting for frayed wires, broken plugs, sockets, etc.
- Never overload outlets. Use no more than three strands of lights on a single extension cord, or follow manufacturer's instructions.
- Consider buying new energy efficient LED lights that don't get as hot.
- Always use appropriate weatherproof lights outdoors.

Candle Safety - In past years, candles caused over 100 fires, three civilian deaths, nine civilian injuries, five firefighter injuries and an estimated dollar loss of \$3.9 million in damages. Of the 84 candle fires in homes, 35% occurred in the bedroom. It is all too easy to fall asleep and leave a candle burning unattended in the bedroom.

- Remember to blow out candles before leaving a room or going to bed.
- Burn candles within a one-foot circle, free of anything that can burn.
- Before you go out, blow it out; never leave candles burning unattended.
- Always extinguish candles after use.
- Use a non-combustible saucer or candleholder.
- Keep candles out of reach of children and pets.

Ice Safety Tips:

- Never go onto the ice alone. A friend may be able to rescue you or go for help if you fall through the ice.
- Always keep your pets on a leash. If a pet falls through the ice do not attempt to rescue your pet, go for help.
- New ice is usually stronger than old ice. As the ice ages, the bond between the crystals decays, making it weaker, even if melting has not occurred.
- Beware of ice covered with snow. Snow can insulate ice and keep it strong, but can also insulate it to keep it from freezing. Snow can also hide cracks, weak, or open ice.
- Slush is a danger sign, indicating that ice is no longer freezing from the bottom and can be weak or deteriorating.
- Ice formed over flowing water (rivers or lakes containing a large number of springs) is generally 15% weaker.

Together, we can improve the life safety and well -being of our Granville residents!

Woodlands Cemetery Update and History

Winter has settled in, all is quiet. The Welcome sign and the Information box have been removed until Spring. The veterans' flags were removed just after Veteran's Day as they should be according to the Veterans Administration and the VFW thus preventing the flags from being damaged and disrespectfully flown over the winter. New flag holders have been purchased and placed to accommodate those sites that had no holder.

The repair project for this year, funded by the Community Preservation Act, was completed in September. We are happy to say that the hazardous stones have been secured and the fallen and broken stones previously noted in the Caller have been righted and repaired. This gets our cemetery in very good shape. We expect that there will be only a few leftover items to address

next year. The 3 stones that had fallen and broken happened to be children's stones. We're happy to now have them upright. They are Mary Griswold age 9 months, Frank and Lillianetta Phelon ages 9 and 2, and Luella Williams age 3.



We are attempting to rally interest and commitment to address similar and badly needed repairs in Main Road and Northeast (Old Westfield Road) Cemeteries.

243 years ago, in 1776, not only were we waging a war of independence but there was also a major threat in the form of a smallpox epidemic. In Granville, it is reported that smallpox took the lives of 7 people. And being that the townspeople were understandably afraid of the continual spread of the disease, those who died from it were buried in a separate area. The Smallpox Cemetery is unmarked and the most specific location documented anywhere is "on the mountain". Children were especially susceptible to smallpox. According to the records of Reverend Timothy Mather Cooley, the seven who are buried there are Amena Stiles age 4, Mary Seward age 6, Asa Simons age 25, Asa Haven age 25, Mary Sweatman age 88, Nathaniel Bates



Age 2 and Hannah Gibbons.

Hannah Gibbons was only 2 when she was stricken and did not recover. She was the daughter of Peter and Sarah Green Gibbons (Main Rd. Cemetery) and the sister of Timothy and Jedidiah Gibbons (Woodlands Cemetery).

Hannah's father, Peter, built the house at 502 South Lane in 1771 and it is still standing. Before the

house was built, Peter and Sarah had a cabin at that location where, it is said, that in August of 1752 Hannah's mother Sarah chased a black bear away from her outdoor bread oven with a club. Oven Rock is reportedly still there. The house was featured in the Granville Bicentennial Tour Book in 1954. Peter served in the Revolutionary War under Capt. Lebbeus Ball. Cont'd.....

The very next year in 1777, as soldiers returned from the war, they brought with them what was then known as Camp Fever. It was known also as Camp Distemper and today it is typhus. During that time other ailments could have been lumped into the Camp Fever category; in any case, it was very contagious and as such, very alarming. Similar to the creation of the Smallpox Cemetery, the town established a Camp Distemper Burial Ground... also unmarked, also located "on the mountain". Again children were especially susceptible. It is documented that 37 Granville people died of Camp Fever in 1777. At least 29 of them were children. Sarah Bancroft, age 5, and Malenda Bancroft, age 1, died within 7 days of each other. They were the daughters of Samuel Jr. and Elizabeth Spelman Bancroft and the granddaughters of Granville's first settler, Samuel and Sarah White Bancroft. Both Samuel and Samuel Jr. fought in the Revolution. Parents and grandparents are buried in Main Rd. Cemetery.

We hope that sometime in the not too distant future, we can have a sign or plaque at either Woodlands or a different Granville cemetery that will list the known names of those who are buried in each of the 2 cemeteries "on the mountain".





Following this, a license is issued and you can be married any place in the Commonwealth. Your marriage license is filed at the Town Clerk's Office where the Marriage Intentions Form is completed.
