Woodlands Cemetery Update and History

September is here and with it the anticipation of yet another beautiful autumn season in our wonderful town.

Before Home Depot, Tractor Supply, IBS, and Walmart, there were numerous mills and shops right here in town that took care of many the necessities of the farm and family living of the time.



Abel Curtis was reportedly the first blacksmith in town about 1754 and Jonathan Rose began the first sawmill in town having run a sawmill in Enfield for a time. Frame houses came early to Granville.


The Holcombs owned a blacksmith shop (the Barnes Blacksmith Shop) in the center of town that was torn down before 1920.

Roswell Rowley owned a blacksmith shop next to 522 Main Rd.





Nathaniel Hubbard (1718-1762) had a mill on the Hubbard River near the State Forest. It was, at one time, a gristmill, sawmill, and fulling mill (hooks). Eventually the mill also made wooden bowls, custom wooden parts and piano keys. Nathaniel died accidently when he drowned trying to clear logs at his mill. He is buried in Main Rd cemetery.



The Arnold's, who lived on North Lane, had a sawmill probably also on North Lane.



Woodlands Cemetery Update and History Cont'd



Albion Wilson describes the powder keg process in his History of Granville:

In 1857, there were 20 sawmills identified in Granville. "Possibly the largest number encountered in any town in the county." (MA Hist Comm)

In addition to blacksmith shops, gristmills, sawmills and powder keg makers, Granville also made leather satchels, handmade shoes, painted wagons, ox carts, jewelry, parquet The following illustration and caption was published in The *Granville Center News*, July 21, 1934:

"FOUNDATION OF THE OLD WELLS MILL ON THE WILDCAT ROAD About 90 years ago this mill made wooden dishes, bowls, spoons and powder kegs, the latter being hauled by team to the powder factory in Hazardville. Later they made chestnut piano legs."

This dates the Wildcat Rd. mill as being in existence in the 1840's. It was built by William Wells who is buried in Silver St. Cemetery. As of a few years ago, maybe even today, this foundation was still visible on Wildcat Road.

In bygone days gun powder was manufactured in Enfield, Connecticut, and it was necessary, on grounds of safety, to have wooden containers in which to transport this dangerous substance, and the making of kegs for this use became an important industry. Whether or not Granville had a monopoly of the manufacture of powder kegs, it is certain that a great many such kegs were made in town. The staves and heads were of chestnut and the hoops of alder. Granville had an endless supply of both these trees right at hand. There were small mills on every stream and the necessary machinery was simple and primitive. Chestnut was a very stiff, dry, light wood, but it sometimes had been bored through and through by small worms about the size of the lead in a lead pencil. These little holes would let moisture into the keg and damage the powder, so to meet this difficulty small boys were employed to drive wooden shoe pegs into them. One peg would fill one hole so snugly that it could only with difficulty be extracted. These powder kegs were all taken to Enfield and sold at the powder mills there. For many years the keg makers in Granville could not find any feasible way to make the bungs for the kegs, and the Shakers in Enfield had a monopoly of the manufacture of this small but absolutely necessary part. Finally, Holcomb Brothers, who had a small water power and shop a short distance east of the present drum shop of the Noble and Cooley Co. went to Enfield and learned the process. Thereafter they made all the bungs for the Granville kegs.

floors, wooden hoops for barrels, gloves, shingles, whips and we almost had a hoop shop for hoop skirts. We had a "spectacle shop", a tannery, a tin shop, a paint shop, and, of course, a drum shop.

Today, we still have our Granville Country Store. Thank you for that.



What's new at the Library? What's up with all the trucks? The library always has answers!

Thanks to the Green Initiative, we added new energy efficient split systems to heat and cool our air. We are preparing to repair the front steps this month and we will be renovating the basement after that. Until the renovations are done and COVID is still hanging in there, we can not yet hold meetings here. HOWEVER, we are getting ready for **LIMITED OPENING** for in person browsing, starting on Wednesdays (Sept 2), from 4-8, and Saturdays (Sept 5), 10-12. Upon arrival at the Library you must call 413-357-853, give your name and cell number and the number of adults and children in your party. No phone: one person in party knock on door. You will be placed on a list in the order of arrival and called to come in, when it is your turn to enter the Library, if there are others in the library. Otherwise, you will be simply welcomed into the library. CURBSIDE WILL CONTINUE FOR ALL HOURS.

- At this time, there is a 3 adult patron limit, unless your whole group traveled together in one vehicle and normally spends non-social distancing time together. There is a one-child/one adult limit for the children's room or one family. There is a 20-minute browsing limit.
- Hands must be sanitized at the front door sanitizing station immediately upon entering.
- Masks, properly covering nose and mouth, must be worn at all times
- Maintain 6 ft safety distance. Check out will be through the screen at the counter.
